Research Abstract

Involvement of Coastal Communities in Integrated Coastal Management: A Review of Experiences in Southeast Asia

Integrated Coastal Management (ICM) is a significant model for the countries of the world. The concept of ICM is the same in each country, however different activities or techniques have been adapted that are suitable for each individual country. In Southeast Asia, the ICM project was initiated in the Philippines in 1974 then extended to other countries in this region. Based on the Japanese system, Thailand began to implement in 1995 Community Based Fisheries Management projects. These were extended to 4 project sites within 8 years. Through implementation some activities succeeded and some failed. Why are some countries in this region successful? This study provides a comparative analysis of appropriation models for Thailand and surrounding countries through case studies of Community Based Fisheries.
