



**Second Regional Review of  
The Madrid International Plan of Action on Ageing (MIPAA)**

UN House, Beirut, Lebanon  
7-9 December 2011

**Aide-Mémoire**

**I. Introduction.**

The Madrid International Plan of Action on Ageing (MIPAA) adopted by the Second World Assembly on Ageing in 2002 marked a milestone in international efforts to respond to the challenges of population ageing. It called for changes in attitudes, policies and practices at all levels and in all sectors, so that the enormous potential of “a society for all ages” in the twenty-first century may be fulfilled. As noted in MIPAA, its “systematic review of implementation by Member States is essential for its success in improving the quality of life of older persons”<sup>1</sup>.

The Commission for Social Development at its forty-first session in 2003 considered the modalities for the review and appraisal of MIPAA and endorsed the bottom-up and flexible approach proposed by the UN Secretariat in its note to the Commission<sup>2</sup>. At its forty-second session in 2004, the Commission decided to undertake the review and appraisal of the Plan of Action every five years. The Commission also requested the United Nations regional commissions, within their mandates, to promote and facilitate the implementation, review and appraisal of and dissemination of information about the Madrid Plan of Action at the regional level<sup>3</sup>.

In its resolution 44/1 of 17 February 2006, the GA called upon Governments to promote the bottom-up participatory approach throughout the entire implementation process of the Madrid Plan of Action, and to undertake national review and appraisal exercises of specific identified areas by using the participatory, bottom-up approach. In addition, the regional

commissions were requested to forward their findings of the first review and appraisal, along with identified priorities for future action to the Commission for Social Development. The same resolution also decided to start the first global cycle of review and appraisal of the MIPAA in 2007 and to conclude it in 2008.

In its resolution 2010/14, the Economic and Social Council endorsed the theme “***Full implementation of the Madrid International Plan of Action on Ageing: social situation, well-being and dignity, development and the full realization of all human rights for older persons***” for the second review and appraisal exercise, and also decided that the Commission for Social Development would conduct the global segment of the second review and appraisal at its fifty-first session in 2013. The Economic and Social Council further decided that the procedure of the second review and appraisal of the Madrid Plan of Action would follow the set procedure of the first review and appraisal exercise, and would include preparatory activities at the national and regional levels, including those conducted by the Regional Commissions that conclude in 2012. However, Member States are free to utilize an optional open method of coordination for the review and appraisal, as presented to the forty-eighth session of the Commission.

In response to resolution 44/1, the Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (ESCWA) convened in Amman on 20 and 21 November 2007 a Regional Seminar on the Review and Appraisal of the Madrid International Plan of action on Ageing (MIPAA). The main objective of that Seminar was to review the progress in implementing MIPAA, to share experiences and successful approaches and to assist member countries and relevant regional partners in their programmes for older people.

Towards the second review and appraisal exercise and in line with resolution 2010/14, ESCWA, in its work programme for 2011, has developed a road map to carry out four preparatory activities, as follows:

(1) To publish a *Social Policy Brief* on “Reinforcing Social Equity: Mainstreaming Ageing Issues in the Process of Development Planning in the ESCWA Region”. The objective of this Social Policy Brief on ageing is twofold: (i) to highlight the challenges that member states are faced with in their endeavor to mainstream ageing in national development plans, and (ii) to identify policy actions that are needed to reinforce ageing mainstreaming as part of a social equity approach to social development.

(2) To publish a *Regional Report on the demographic profile of the older people*. The objective of this profile is to provide policymakers with a reference that delineates the trends and patterns of changes in the age structure of old persons, and underlines their implications for development.

(3) To request member countries to prepare *Country Reports on national follow up to the Implementation of MIPAA*.

(4) To organize a *Regional Review Meeting*, in Beirut in December 2011, to discuss the national reports, identify obstacles to the implementation (institutional, structural and circumstantial barriers), and to come up with a set of recommendations that would constitute an agenda for the full implementation of MIPAA.

The underpinning issues in these activities are directly related to the main pillars of MIPAA – i.e., Older persons and development, Health and long-term care, Enabling and supportive environments, and Ageing mainstreaming.

## **II. Objectives of the Regional Review Meeting.**

The objectives of the proposed Meeting are as follows:

- (1) To discuss the national reports and assess adherences of governments to MIPAA;
- (2) To identify obstacles to the implementation of MIPAA (institutional, structural, and circumstantial barriers);
- (3) To review and appraise the implementation of MIPAA in the region;
- (4) To come up with a set of recommendations that would constitute an agenda for the full implementation of MIPAA.

Within the framework of MIPAA, the meeting will pay particular attention to the marginalization of the elderly in the current Arab uprising and the failure of the media to highlight the contribution of older persons to ongoing socio-political developments in the region.

## **III. Place and date.**

The Regional Review Meeting will take place in Beirut, Lebanon, from 7 to 9 December 2011. The venue of the Meeting will be the UN –house in downtown Beirut.

## **IV. Participants.**

High-level officials and Governments' focal points on ageing of ESCWA Member Countries will participate in the Regional Review Meeting. Representatives from the relevant offices of the United Nations system, civil society and academics are also expected to participate.

4. Consideration of draft outcome.
5. Closing of the meeting.

## **VI. Modality.**

The Regional Review Meeting will be conducted during three days. The Meeting will start with the opening statements and keynote speeches by eminent experts of ageing. This will be followed by the Session on “Review of the key developments in the area of ageing since 2002”, which will examine the changing demographic dynamics, overall progress made in the implementation of MIPAA in the region, and the stance of the elderly in the current Arab uprising.

The subsequent thematic session, “Priority issues in the ESCWA region” will focus on the selected topics of primary concerns in the ESCWA region, which had been identified through the Regional Seminar in 2007 organized by ESCWA. On the basis of the presentations of National Reports, responses to the main priority areas of MIPAA, will be discussed and assessed for each participating country. There will be country presentations lasting 20 minutes for each country. Each presentation will be followed by a discussion to collect immediate reactions and recommendations for deliberation.

In the third day, the participants will be divided into two groups during the session on Consideration of Draft Outcome, one group will be tasked with the discussion and finalization of findings, and the other group will be tasked with the discussion of recommendations. After the deliberation of the draft recommendations for actions by the participants at the end of the last session, the Meeting will be concluded with the adoption of a set of recommendations. A regional report on the implementation of MIPAA will be published and disseminated by ESCWA in Arabic and English.

## **VII. Country reports.**

For the benefit of exchanging experience and expertise, designated representatives are invited to prepare a country report of approximately ten to fifteen pages, reviewing the progress made in the implementation of MIPAA in the context of the following priority areas:

- a. Older persons and development.
  - i. Income security, social protection, and poverty prevention.
  - ii. Active participation in society and development.
  - iii. Intergenerational solidarity.
- b. Advancing health and well-being into old age.
  - i. Improving access to health-care services and quality of life.
  - ii. Training of care providers and health professionals.
- c. Ensuring enabling and supportive environments.
  - i. Care and support for care givers.
  - ii. Changing family structures and living environment.
- d. Ageing mainstreaming.

The report should contain information about the promulgation and implementation of policies and ageing-mainstreaming efforts. The report should also identify major barriers (institutional, structural, and circumstantial barriers) to the implementation of MIPAA. The report should be prepared in Arabic and in the manner that matches the Guidelines for Reporting on National follow-up to Madrid International Plan of Action on Ageing (MIPAA).
