Participant Bios

Christina Behrendt is Head of the Social Policy Unit in the International Labour Office (ILO)'s Social Protection Department in Geneva (Switzerland). Her work experience includes assignments as regional social security specialist at the ILO Regional Office for Arab States in Beirut (Lebanon), as consultant at the International Social Security Association (ISSA), and as lecturer and research fellow at the University of Konstanz.

She has worked and published on various aspects of social security in both developed and developing country contexts. Her current work focuses mainly on the extension of social protection in low and middle-income countries.

Haroon Bhorat is a Professor of Economics and Director of the Development Policy Research Unit at the University of Cape Town (UCT). His research interests cover labor economics, poverty, and income distribution. He has co-authored and co-edited a number of books on labor market and poverty issues in Africa. Bhorat has published more than 200 academic journal articles, book chapters, and working papers.

He holds the highly prestigious National Research Chair under the theme of Economic Growth, Poverty and Inequality: Exploring the Interactions for South Africa. He was recently appointed by UCT Vice-Chancellor Professor Phakeng as the university's "SDG academic focal point" to help guide UCT's strategic approach to engagement with the U.N.'s Sustainable Development Goals.

Heejung Chung, University of Kent, is a Reader in Sociology and Social Policy and a member of Kent's Q-Step Centre, and Director of the Welfare State Research Cluster.

Her research interests are broadly around issues concerning cross-national comparative analysis of welfare states and their labour markets. She is currently researching how working time flexibility impacts an individual's work-life balance, and the role of contexts in moderating that influence and how welfare state institutions and socio-economic factors shape individual's perceived employment insecurity.

Andrew Clark is a CNRS Research Professor at the Paris School of Economics (PSE). He previously held posts at Dartmouth, Essex, CEPREMAP, DELTA, the OECD and the University of Orléans. He joined IZA as a Research Fellow in February 2004.

His work has largely focussed on the interface between psychology, sociology and economics; in particular, using job and life satisfaction scores, and other psychological indices, as proxy measures of utility. The broad area is social interactions and social learning.

Pedro Conceição, is the Director of the Human Development Report Office and lead author of the Human Development Report. Prior to this, Pedro served as Director, Strategic Policy, at the Bureau for Policy and Programme Support (from October 2014), and Chief Economist and Head of the Strategic Advisory Unit at the Regional Bureau for Africa (from 1 December 2009).

Prior to coming to UNDP, he was an Assistant Professor at the Instituto Superior Técnico, Technical University of Lisbon, Portugal, teaching and researching on science, technology and innovation policy. He has published in numerous journals on inequality, the economics of innovation and technological change, and development and co-edited several books.

Conchita D'Ambrosio is a Professor of Economics at the Université du Luxembourg. Before joining the University of Luxembourg, she was Associate Professor of Economics at the Università di Milano-Bicocca. She studied economics at the Università Commerciale Luigi Bocconi, Milan, and at New York University, from which latter she obtained her Ph.D. in 2000.

Her research mainly focuses on income and wealth distributions, deprivation, polarization and social exclusion.

Jacob S. Hacker is Stanley Resor Professor of Political Science and Director of the Institution for Social and Policy Studies at Yale University. A regular media commentator and policy adviser, he is the author or co-author of five books, numerous journal articles, and a wide range of popular writings on American politics and public policy.

He is also a member of the OECD's High-Level Expert Group on the Measurement of Economic Performance and Social Progress. He was recently elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

Sangheon Lee is the Director of the Employment Policy Department of the ILO which leads ILO's action for promoting full and productive employment by developing integrated employment, development and skills policies.

He previously served as the Special Adviser to the Deputy Director-General for Policy on Economic and Social Issues (2014-18), providing advice on analytical work, policy development and advocacy across a range of economic, employment and social issues as well as coordinating ILO's work at multilateral fora such as G20, G7, and BRICS.

Nora Lustig is Samuel Z. Stone Professor of Latin American Economics and the founding Director of the Commitment to Equity Institute (CEQ) at Tulane University. She is also a non-resident Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution, the Center for Global Development and the Inter-American Dialogue. Professor Lustig's research is on economic development, inequality and social policies with emphasis on Latin America.

Prof. Lustig is a founding member and President Emeritus of the Latin American and Caribbean Economic Association (LACEA) and was a co-director of the World Bank's World Development Report 2000, Attacking Poverty. She serves on the editorial board of the Journal of Economic Inequality and is a member of the Society for the Study of Economic Inequality's Executive Council. Prof. Lustig served on the Atkinson Commission on Poverty, the High-level Group on Measuring Economic Performance and Social Progress, and the G20 Eminent Persons Group on Global Financial Governance.

Lars Osberg is McCulloch Professor of Economics at Dalhousie University. He received his Ph.D in Economics from Yale University in 1975. He taught at the University of Western Ontario from 1974 to 1977 before moving to Dalhousie University. He has published numerous articles in academic journals and seven books and is a past President of the Canadian Economics Association.

His research is on measurement and determinants of social exclusion and poverty, measurement of economic well-being, leisure co-ordination and economic well-being, time use and economic development and economic insecurity.

Anthony Painter is Chief Research & Impact Officer (CRIO) at the RSA. He leads the Research and Impact team, overseeing research, policy and practical innovation. His own work focuses on a range of policy issues including the impact of new technology on the

economy and society, reform to welfare, work, learning and skills, and reform to public services and a range of public institutions.

He previously directed the Independent Review of the Police Federation and has also worked in partnership with Google, the BBC, the BMA, the Education and Training Foundation, the Association of Colleges and the Metropolitan Police. He is author of three books and regularly appears in national and international media.

Philipp Rehm is an Associate Professor of Political Science at Ohio State University; previous posts include the Postdoctoral Prize Research Fellowship at Nuffield College, Oxford University. His work is located at the intersection of political economy and political behaviour.

He is interested in the causes and consequences of income dynamics (such as income loss, income volatility, and risk exposure). At the micro-level, his research explores how income dynamics shape individual preferences for redistribution, social policies, and parties. At the macro-level, his work analyzes the impact of labour market and income dynamics on polarization, electoral majorities, and coalitions underpinning social policy.
