Global pandemic is hindering SDGs implementation



- The impact is unclear, long-lasting, difficult to measure
- SDGs were not on track (HLPF, 2020) Several Targets of SDG1, SDG8, SDG10, SDG11, SDG13, in regress
- Global pandemic changed priorities of member states
- Important not to lose what is achieved
- Recovery towards sustainability

Impact of global pandemic for society

- 101 million people will live in poverty
- 83-132 million more in hunger and malnutrition
- 90% of countrie's health services disruption
- 1.5 billion learners affected
- Temporary reduction of CO2 emissions, but overall increase of Greenhouse Gases
- Production of data crucial for SDGs disrupted
- Enhanced pressure for cooperation



2030 Agenda is indivisible



- 17 SDGs are interconnected
- Progress/regress in one SDG influences other SDGs
- Interconnections are context dependent
- Pandemic context has intensified interconnections between specific SDGs
- Identifying interconnections is important for recovery process and future challenges
