Biographies of experts



Gonzalo Baroni Boces is National Director of Education in the Ministry of Education and Culture of Uruguay. He is responsible for the coordination of the national education and leading innovative programs, including lifelong learning and a comprehensive reform of the national teacher training program. He is an advocate for educational inequities with extensive experience in public policy and education, and teaching in vulnerable communities in Uruguay. He is also an Assistant professor at ORT University in Uruguay.



Dr. Venkatraman Chandra-Mouli works on Adolescent Sexual and Reproductive Health in the World Health Organization's Department of Reproductive Health and Research. His work includes building the epidemiologic and evidence base and supporting countries to translate this evidence into action through well-conceived and well-managed policies and programs. He has contributed to strengthening policies and programmes, in different social, cultural and economic contexts, and authored several publications in peer-reviewed journal articles and World Health Organization's publications.



Joanna Herat is Senior Programme Specialist at UNESCO HQ, within the Section for Health and Education. Working at UNESCO since 2010, she provides policy and technical leadership to improve health and wellbeing for young people through education with a particular focus on comprehensive sexuality education, school-related gender-based violence and the role of education in improving adolescent sexual and reproductive health. Joanna has worked in countries across Asia and Africa, with community-based HIV interventions in the NGO sector, and an early career specialisation in theatre-in-education programmes.



Alex Howells is an Education Specialist at the UNESCO Institute for Lifelong Learning (UIL) and a member of the Policy Support and Capacity Development in Lifelong Learning team. He helps organize online courses and workshops aimed at national policymakers, with the aim of developing education systems from a lifelong learning perspective, as well as supporting stakeholders at the city level through the UNESCO Global Network of Learning Cities. He also contributes to the development of UIL's publications on lifelong learning. Before joining UIL, Alex taught in the formal education system in the United Kingdom.



Julius N. Nghifikwa is Deputy-Director in the Directorate of Programmes and Quality Assurance in the Ministry of Education, Arts and Culture. He is responsible for coordinating the design and implementation of integrated school health programmes, teacher capacity enhancement to deliver Life Skills-based HIV and Health Education curriculum, including Provision of Psychosocial Support services, Comprehensive Sexuality Education and Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights for the adolescents and young people. He is responsible for promoting and strengthening partnerships, and coordination of programmes to address issues affecting the learners.



Cheryl Sawyer is Senior Population Affairs Officer in the Population Division of the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs. She leads the Division's programme planning and management and is a core member of the team responsible for substantive support to the Commission on Population and Development. She has contributed to numerous reports of the Secretary-General and technical publications on population issues. Prior to joining the United Nations, she worked in the International Programs Center of the United States Census Bureau.



Sandile Simelane is a Technical Specialist in the Population and Development Branch at UNFPA. Prior to joining the United Nations, he worked for Statistics South Africa for several years. He has also worked for the Development Bank of Southern Africa (DBSA) where he was Development Information Analyst and the University of KwaZulu-Natal (UKZN) where he was Senior Lecturer in the Graduate Program in Population Studies at the School of Development Studies.



John Wilmoth is Director of the Population Division of the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs. He is Professor Emeritus at the University of California, Berkeley's Department of Demography. He is the author or co-author of more than 50 scientific papers on various aspects of population dynamics. From 2009 to 2012, he was engaged as a consultant by the World Health Organization and the World Bank to lead the development of new maternal mortality estimates for the global monitoring of the Millennium Development Goals.
