Growing human population cannot be sustainably fed without urgent overhaul of food systems

Countries to discuss the way forward at UN Commission

What

Under the theme, 'Population, food security, nutrition and sustainable development,' the 54th session of the Commission on Population and Development, from 19 to 23 April, will discuss how the global food system can produce adequate, safe, affordable and nutritious food for a growing human population within planetary boundaries.

Why

In 2019, 690 million people were malnourished and for more than 3 billion people around the world, healthy diets were unaffordable. With population growth expected to reach 9.7 billion by 2050, according to UN estimates, an urgent overhaul of global food systems is needed to promote more sustainable patterns of production and consumption, minimizing the impacts on climate and biodiversity.
