






Asia and the Pacific has transitioned

Sexual and reproductive health, services and rights Examples














- There have been significant improvements in the expansion of the provision of sexual and reproductive health information and services, maternal health, and others over recent decades
- However, wide variations across the region and within countries (urban/rural; socio-economic status etc.) remain
- Many women face challenges in countries with restrictive laws which may, in turn, result in unplanned or unintended pregnancies
- For example, GBV, unsafe abortions, unmet need for family planning, gender identity and others remain a challenge
- Access to treatment for sexually transmitted infections can be challenging and often stigmatising
- The demand for Assisted Reproductive Technology is growing; however, these services are often out of reach for many






Population age structures have changed from pyramid to rectangular in Asia and the Pacific, 1950, 2023, 2050

Growth in the population 60+ by Asia-Pacific subregion, 1950-210





Change in the population 15-64 between 2023 and 2050 for selected Asia-Pacific countries





Employment of persons 60 years or over in the informal sector of the economy as a percentage of total non-agricultural employment, selected Asia-Pacific countries, by sex, latest available year






Legal coverage of contributory pensions, percentage of the working-age population (15-64 years), selected countries in Asia and the Pacific, 2020 or latest available year





In many countries in Asia and the Pacific, low public health-care expenditures lead to high out-of-pocket expenditures


Out-of-pocket and public health expenditures, 2020





In Asia and the Pacific, digitalization has benefitted older persons, but the "grey digital divide" persists


Access to the Internet by age group, selected countries in Asia and the Pacific, 2020 or latest available year

The number of foreign-born from Asia and the Pacific² residing in other countries has increased since the 1990s




Asia and the Pacific is highly affected by natural/man-made disasters, including those related to climate change



- The region faces numerous environmental threats, including slow-onset disasters such as sea-level rise and drought and sudden-onset disasters, such as typhoons, hurricanes and floods.
- Climate change not only directly affects people's lives, health and wellbeing, but it also intensifies socioeconomic disparities, contributes to population displacement and exacerbates conflicts.
- People are highly dependent on natural resources and agriculture, and they live in densely populated coastal areas.
- Many countries have weak institutions, lack social protection, and poverty remains prevalent among a considerable proportion of the population.
- The effects of climate change are not shared equally across the region.




