

8th Conference of State Parties Preventing and Eliminating Violence against Girls and Women with Disabilities: Learning from Good Practices in Nine Countries

There are more than 500 million women and girls with disabilities worldwide. Gender-based violence more frequently affects women and girls with disabilities but they remain largely invisible on the global development agenda and in humanitarian policy responses.
