Explanatory memorandum

Peacekeeping operations now constitute one of the most important activities of the United Nations, and safeguarding the important task of peacekeeping is a responsibility that involves all Member States, especially as far as the expenses of such operations are concerned.

The circumstances under which the methodology used to apportion the expenses of peacekeeping operations among Member States was designed have changed. It is clear that the political and economic context in which the Organization must operate now requires a redefinition of the current special scale. For this reason, it is relevant to examine whether the current special scale of assessments for peacekeeping operations is the most appropriate one to enable the Organization to discharge its responsibilities effectively in this area, in a renewed international context in which it is expected and required to do so. The review of the scale of assessments should, however, be carried out solely on the principle of a fair share in accordance with the level of economic development of each country. The methodology for determining the scale of assessments should adhere strictly to the principle of capacity to pay. In this connection, Costa Rica will not support any effort to amend the scale that would imply the abandonment of this principle.

Lastly, the item on the methodology of the scale of assessments should continue to be assigned to the Fifth Committee, in order to safeguard its highly technical and financial nature and, to the extent possible, prevent the discussion of the item from evolving into a political discussion.
