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Report of the Secretary-General*

I. Introduction

1. In its resolution 55/136 B of 8 December 2000, the General Assembly requested the Secretary-General to report to the Committee on Information at its twenty-third session, in 2001, and to the General Assembly at its fifty-sixth session on the activities of the Department of Public Information and on the implementation of the recommendations contained in the resolution. The present report is prepared in response to the resolution and updates the information already provided.

2. Eight reports were prepared for consideration by the Committee on Information at its twenty-third session, held from 30 April to 11 May 2001 (A/AC.198/2001/2-9). The Interim Head of the Department of Public Information offered additional substantive information in his opening statement to the Committee. The Committee resumed its twenty-third session from 5 to 7 September to consider the final report of the Secretary-General on the implementation of the pilot project on the development of an international radio broadcasting capacity for the United Nations (A/AC.198/2001/10). The deliberations of the Committee are reflected in its report to the General Assembly.¹

II. Overview

3. The Department of Public Information has made every effort to strengthen the communication function within the United Nations, including in offices in the field, so as to create an informed understanding of the Organization's work and to build broad-based global support for it. With the strong encouragement of the Secretary-General, it has reoriented its activities to ensure that communication is placed at the heart of the strategic management of the Organization. As a result of the wide public interest in the Organization generated by the Millennium Summit, the Department is directing the United Nations message to the local level. A new programme, entitled "United Nations Works", has been designed by the Department to showcase success stories and to demonstrate the impact of the Organization's activities on people around the world. Essential to local outreach are the activities and programmes of the United Nations information centres and the Department's strengthened partnerships with

key redisseminators, especially the media and non-governmental organizations.

4. Through the use of the latest technologies, the Department is retooling its capabilities so as to widen the Organization's outreach in a fast-moving and competitive communications environment. As the Secretary-General pointed out in his report entitled "We the peoples: the role of the United Nations in the twenty-first century", every year the vast electronic treasure house of information available on the United Nations web site becomes accessible at no cost to millions more people (A/54/2000, para. 344). The Department of Public Information is continuously working to enhance the web site. Given that the total number of visitors in 2001 is expected to exceed 1 billion, up from 488,369,528 in 2000 and only 11,547,325 in 1996, those efforts are proving highly successful. In the past year, the Department has initiated two major services to deliver news directly to the media and other audiences around the globe. The pilot project for live United Nations radio broadcasting, begun during last year's Millennium Summit, now brings the voices of the United Nations to tens of millions of radio listeners in virtually every country. On any given day, audiences around the world can hear the Secretary-General speaking at Headquarters, the Force Commander of a peacekeeping mission addressing the media or a rural family discussing how a United Nations sanitation programme has transformed the life of its village. Through the second initiative, the electronic mail-based United Nations News Service, to be launched in October 2001, the Department will be able to instantaneously provide specially targeted information to influential journalists in every region. Both initiatives are also important elements in the overall drive by the Department to bridge the gap in the ability of the media in industrialized and developing countries to immediately access important news developments from the United Nations system.

5. The Department is actively responding to the call by the General Assembly to maintain and improve its activities in areas in which developing countries have special needs. This is being done, for example, through the special outreach of the United Nations information centres in the field, through training programmes at Headquarters for media practitioners from developing countries and through the Department's focus on designing special communication strategies for the current cycle of conferences and special sessions of the

General Assembly on economic and social issues. Furthermore, the Department's widespread and continued use of traditional means of dissemination, including radio and print, takes into consideration the needs of its audiences on the other side of the digital divide.

6. The Joint United Nations Information Committee continues to be an important mechanism for the coordination of public information activities within the United Nations system. At its 2001 session, the Committee took concrete steps to revitalize its structures and its work programme by dropping routine, annually recurring agenda items in favour of a focus on shared challenges in the area of communications and policy issues of common concern.

III. United Nations web site

7. The United Nations web site provides the latest daily information on the activities of the Organization and receives, on average, close to 3.5 million visits daily from people in more than 156 countries. Through its Information Technology Section, the Department has continued to strengthen the coordination and management of the site and to offer guidance on a regular basis to many other content-providing areas, both inside and outside the Secretariat, in support of their Internet activities. In early 2002, all parliamentary documents in the six official languages will be available through the new Official Document System on the United Nations web site, thereby greatly increasing the amount of material available on the non-English language sites. Most new material is now being added to the web site in all official languages, and it is important to note that the non-English language sites are developing at a faster rate than the English site. Usage of those sites has also increased considerably. To help further coordinate the Organization's Internet publishing, the United Nations Publications Board, which is chaired by the Head of the Department, recently issued new policy guidelines (ST/AI/2001/5). They provide, among other things, for setting up an interdepartmental working group on Internet matters, which is to be chaired by the Chief of the Department's Information Technology Section.

8. One of the major achievements during the past year was the successful development of the in-house capability for live webcasting. As a result, the Department, with the cooperation of the Information

Technology Services Division of the Department of Management, provided live webcasts of the special sessions of the General Assembly for an overall review and appraisal of the implementation of the outcome of the United Nations Conference on Human Settlements (Habitat II) and on HIV/AIDS. Special arrangements were also made for a live webcast of the World Conference against Racism, Racial Discrimination, Xenophobia and Related Intolerance. Although the existing equipment will need to be upgraded and staff skills enhanced to continue webcasting on an ongoing basis, the Department is already webcasting on a trial basis the daily noon briefings by the Spokesman for the Secretary-General.

9. In 2001, the United Nations CyberSchoolBus, the site for young people and teachers, implemented a uniform database-driven navigational system and launched a redesign of the site to help ensure its functionality and popularity with teachers and students worldwide. Considerable content has been translated and reprogrammed into French and Russian, with the Arabic-, Chinese- and Spanish-language versions under preparation. The CyberSchoolBus has also developed a number of new high-quality materials.

10. As part of its continuing efforts to help bridge the digital divide, over the past year the Department has organized three training seminars on the use of the Internet as a tool for development: two in Beirut, in cooperation with the International Organization of la Francophonie, and one in New York. The Beirut seminars were conducted in Arabic and French. The first, held in October 2000, brought together 30 specialists in institutional communication from the region. The second, held in April 2001, focused on the use of the Internet by the media, with the participation of media organizations based in Beirut. The New York seminar, held in March 2001 with 30 participants from 19 permanent missions of Spanish-speaking Member States, aimed to promote the availability of information in Spanish. As a result, 15 permanent missions have established their own web sites in Spanish, all linked to the United Nations site.

IV. General public information activities

A. Services to the media

11. In order to project a more open and transparent institution, the Office of the Spokesman for the Secretary-General continued to inform the accredited press, delegations and the public at large on the broad scope of United Nations activities, as well as the day-to-day movements of the Secretary-General. Using Internet technology to widen coverage of the Secretary-General, the Office added a new section to its web page containing the Secretary-General's latest statements. Included in the upgraded site is a quote of the day. Other information is updated daily, including the Secretary-General's "off-the-cuff" statements to the press, his daily appointments and travel records, schedules of press conferences, highlights of the daily press briefings and fact sheets of interest to the media.

12. Guided by General Assembly resolution 54/82 B of 6 December 1999, in which the Assembly established a pilot project for the development of an international radio broadcasting capacity for the United Nations, the Department is now producing 15-minute packages of news, interviews, in-depth backgrounders, features and peacekeeping mission updates, along with coverage of a range of social, human rights, economic, humanitarian and other activities of the entire United Nations system. The programmes, prepared five days a week (including holidays) in the six official languages of the Organization, are aired live to listeners around the world. They are also posted on the United Nations web site and sent to radio stations that are technologically equipped to handle the electronic file transfer protocol on the Internet. The programme's partner stations include international broadcasters such as China Radio International, Channel Africa, the Voice of Russia, Afrique No. 1, Radio Habana Cuba, la Voz de los Andes and CANA Radio. On the national level, it reaches Radio Cairo, Radio Beirut, Radio Abu Dhabi, China National Radio, Voice of Nigeria, Radio Tunisia, Radio Côte d'Ivoire, Radio Nacional de Venezuela, Radio Educación de México and Radio Sandino in Nicaragua, among others. Merlin Communications Network and the Canal de la Francophonie broadcast United Nations programming through satellite. Through the use of a combination of shortwave transmission, satellite distribution, digital

and analog telephone lines and the Internet, the profile of the United Nations has been raised significantly. Improving distribution methods in order to provide reliable audio of the highest quality is a priority as live radio moves into its second year. The Department also continues to distribute telephone feeds in the six official languages, as well as in Kiswahili and Portuguese, and to send taped programmes in 15 languages to stations that do not have the technical capacity to receive the live broadcasts. The Department, assisted by its network of information centres, continues to build and expand the network of rebroadcasting partners. The determined support of Member States and their national broadcasting networks is crucial to the continued success of live radio. At the same time, the radio web pages have been redesigned, and a Portuguese page was added in May.

13. The Department continued to enhance the electronic delivery of news on all aspects of the activities of the United Nations system in real time to audiences worldwide, including to the media, non-governmental organizations and their news outlets, and the public at large. The News Centre on the United Nations web site is the central portal for accessing news and related source materials and links, and special emphasis has been placed on improving its usability, functionality and visual attractiveness. With the development of a fully database-driven application, the redesigned News Centre site offers a vastly improved search function, allowing the user to access information by thematic and geographical categories and, at the same time, to quickly retrieve related materials. The Department is working to develop the ability of United Nations offices around the world to post news directly onto the central News Centre, thereby making it a 24-hour operation. The first offices to do so will be those in Geneva and Pristina.

14. To further deepen direct working relationships with journalists worldwide, an enhanced, automated version of the electronic mail service, developed in conjunction with the United Nations News Centre, is currently in the pilot phase, allowing subscribers to receive highly customized daily news digests as well as alerts about upcoming major events. During the year, the Department, working in cooperation with the United Nations information centres, has used its electronic mailing list of senior journalists to disseminate statements of the Secretary-General and senior officials in advance. This effort to project the

United Nations perspective on important international issues has been reinforced by the coordinated worldwide placement of op-ed and other opinion pieces by the Secretary-General and senior officials.

15. As part of its media outreach, the Department held the fourth programme in its successful series of briefings for senior journalists. With the financial support of the Government of Japan and the assistance of United Nations information centres and services, 14 Asian editors and broadcasters were brought to New York in May 2001. As was the case with previous briefing programmes organized for African journalists and United States editorial writers, representatives of influential media were given the opportunity to talk with senior United Nations officials. Planning is under way for similar programmes for journalists from the Middle East and from Latin America and the Caribbean, pending the identification of funding.

16. United Nations Television has continued to produce and distribute programmes covering events at Headquarters. Its pictures are also used in all live webcasts from Headquarters. To facilitate that effort, labour-saving robotic television cameras were introduced this spring. The Department has continued to produce the weekly television news programme "UN in Action", which is distributed in five languages to broadcasters in more than 100 countries. It can now also be accessed by international audiences through streaming video on the United Nations web site. The programme "World Chronicle" was also produced and shown on cable television stations in some 35 countries, and the annual 15-minute round-up of world affairs, "Year in Review", reached wide audiences through satellite television and the Internet.

17. This year the Department produced three special documentaries. "Armed to the Teeth" is a one-hour programme, prepared in cooperation with the Department of Disarmament Affairs, on the worldwide proliferation of small arms, and "Legacies of War" is a 45-minute programme on the problems of people emerging from conflict. Both won awards at international film festivals and were distributed widely to international broadcasters. In connection with the special session of the General Assembly on HIV/AIDS, a 28-minute documentary on AIDS in South Africa, entitled "Together We Can", was co-produced with Synergy Films.

18. In November 2000 the Department organized the fifth United Nations World Television Forum, bringing together some 1,000 industry leaders and experts from around the world to examine how the television industry could contribute to bridging the digital divide. The next Forum will be held in 2002 to allow sufficient time for the Department to review with its partners the format and focus of the Forum so as to make it an even more important world media event.

19. The Department's 2001 training programme for broadcasters and journalists from developing countries was held at Headquarters from 10 September to 19 October. Owing to budgetary constraints, this year's programme included only 12 participants, a smaller number than usual. To date, more than 300 journalists from almost 140 countries have participated.

B. Outreach to non-governmental organizations and educational institutions

20. The Department undertook special initiatives to improve its working relationships with the 1,600 associated non-governmental organizations and to review the list of those accredited. It has focused on a new system to monitor compliance with the criteria for association and on increased outreach to non-governmental organizations beyond United Nations Headquarters. There has been unprecedented interest in association, and since October 2000 32 additional organizations have been associated. In conjunction with United Nations information centres and services and non-governmental organizations in Africa, Europe and the Americas, the Department has continued to provide interactive videoconferencing for some of its weekly briefings for non-governmental organizations, which are often co-sponsored by United Nations system partners and attract a steady audience of 150 to 200 people at Headquarters.

21. The Department's fifty-fourth annual conference for non-governmental organizations was expected to be held from 10 to 12 September 2001 on the theme "Non-governmental organizations today: diversity of the volunteer experience". Some 2,000 representatives of 600 organizations from 90 countries participated on opening day. The President of Mexico made a statement to the gathering on videotape, which was also addressed by the Secretary-General and the

President of the General Assembly. However, as a result of the events of 11 September, the Conference was interrupted and a closing meeting was rescheduled on 13 September 2001.

C. Services to the public

22. The Department of Public Information has continued to focus on improving the experience of visitors to United Nations Headquarters. In October 2000 an updated and expanded disarmament exhibit was introduced on the tour route. More recently, new monitors featuring visual presentations on the Security Council and on the economic and social issues addressed by the United Nations system were installed along the tour route in the Conference Building. Using new technologies to attract more visitors, last May the Department launched a web site on the guided tour operation. Information on visiting Headquarters is fully available in all six official languages, and in abbreviated form in German, Italian, Japanese, Portuguese and Swedish.

23. Many groups visiting Headquarters participate in briefing programmes that the Department organizes for university students and non-governmental organizations. It also continues to facilitate the annual opening and closing sessions of the National High School and College Model United Nations Conferences of the United States, with each bringing more than 2,000 students to Headquarters. In addition, many Secretariat staff participated in outside speaking engagements throughout North America.

24. The prolonged closing of the Secretariat Building to visitors as a result of the events of 11 September had a negative effect on the Department's ability to provide services to the public during that period.

V. Thematic information programmes

25. The Department of Public Information must give a public face to the work of all Secretariat departments and organizational units. To do so, it uses its communication expertise to formulate and disseminate specific messages around the world and to systematically incorporate the communication goals of other departments into advocacy campaigns. Print, radio and television products are part of its communication strategy, and sometimes have the

benefit of pro bono expertise provided by global public relations firms. Close ties are also forged with journalists covering specialized areas, as well as with civil society groups. Communication strategies have been implemented by the Department to promote the global conferences and special sessions of the General Assembly on development issues, held throughout the past year.

26. The state of the world's 49 poorest countries and a plan for their social and economic progress were publicized by the Department in connection with the Third United Nations Conference on the Least Developed Countries, held in Brussels in May 2001. A press kit was produced and 100 key "influencers" were contacted to help brief the media on technical issues, leading to editorial board meetings with key publications, a related "United Nations Works" campaign and widespread coverage in print and broadcast media in both the North and the South. For the special session of the General Assembly on human settlements, held in June, the Department developed and mounted a global information programme on "the Urban Millennium", in close cooperation with the United Nations Centre for Human Settlements (Habitat).

27. The twenty-sixth special session of the General Assembly, on HIV/AIDS, was a major focus of the Department's work throughout the past year. In coordination with the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) and its co-sponsor agencies, it has helped to raise awareness of the role of the United Nations in the fight against HIV/AIDS and to galvanize political commitment and resources. A detailed joint communication strategy was developed by the Department and UNAIDS, with input from all UNAIDS co-sponsors, and was later expanded to include the Secretary-General's call to action on HIV/AIDS. The massive media interest contributed significantly to raising the international profile of the AIDS issue and ensuring the success of the special session. The lighting of the Headquarters Building with the red AIDS ribbon from 23 to 25 June to provide a visual image for the event was covered widely, as was the unfolding of the AIDS memorial quilt.

28. In the field of human rights, the Department focused its efforts on the World Conference against Racism, Racial Discrimination, Xenophobia and Related Intolerance. In close cooperation with the United Nations Office of the High Commissioner for

Human Rights, it developed a communication strategy that was implemented through print products, special events, radio and television programming, art contests, exhibits, addresses to non-governmental organizations and a multimedia web site. The Department provided coverage and communications support for the Conference, and also accredited 1,140 media representatives.

29. In its advocacy activities for the advancement of women, the Department continued its ongoing multimedia communication strategy to support the implementation of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action of the Fourth World Conference on Women,² as well as the political declaration and further actions and initiatives adopted by the twenty-third special session of the General Assembly, held in June 2000 (resolutions S-23/2, annex, and S-23/3, annex). The Department is producing a publication in the six official languages containing those important documents.

30. In close cooperation with the Department of Economic and Social Affairs, the Department formulated a comprehensive information strategy to promote United Nations efforts to improve the situation of youth. A major focus was the fourth session of the World Youth Forum of the United Nations system, held at Dakar in August. In cooperation with the United Nations Children's Fund, the Department launched an international media campaign to publicize the special session of the General Assembly on children, scheduled for September 2001, but later postponed.

31. In preparation for the Second World Assembly on Ageing, to be held in Madrid next April, the Department has launched an international public service announcement campaign for television, radio and print media. The production of promotional materials has also been initiated.

32. The Department has begun to promote the International Conference on Financing for Development, to be held in Monterrey, Mexico, next March. Publicity was given in the past year to the report of the Secretary-General on financing for development, issued early in 2001 (A/AC.257/12), and the report of the High-level Panel on Financing for Development, chaired by former President of Mexico, Ernesto Zedillo, issued in June (A/55/1000).

33. The Department has been working closely with the secretariat of the World Summit on Sustainable

Development to build worldwide interest for this event, scheduled for September 2002.

34. In the area of peace and security, the Department has continued to publicize through a variety of media the work of United Nations peacekeeping, peacemaking and peace-building missions, as well as disarmament activities. It maintains web pages on current United Nations peace operations, and has continued to provide operational support to the public information components of peacekeeping and other field missions. In May 2001, representatives of the Department of Public Information and the Department of Peacekeeping Operations visited the United Nations Observer Mission in the Democratic Republic of the Congo in connection with planning for the establishment of United Nations radio stations. The Department is now assisting the Department of Peacekeeping Operations in strengthening the public information component of the Mission.

35. In the context of the report of the Panel on United Nations Peace Operations (A/55/305-S/2000/809) and subsequent reports of the Secretary-General on the implementation of the Panel's recommendations, the Department has continued its close cooperation with the Department of Peacekeeping Operations and the Department of Political Affairs to improve the public information capacity of peacekeeping and other field missions. In addition to the ongoing work, consultations are under way with other relevant Secretariat offices on the implementation of specific projects, such as standard operating procedures, start-up kits, new information technologies, rapid deployment and a conceptual design for an integrated process for establishing a new field information operation.

36. On disarmament-related issues, the Department mounted a public information campaign to promote the United Nations Conference on the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons in All Its Aspects, held in July 2001, encouraging widespread interest by the media and civil society organizations. On the first day of the Conference, designated as Small Arms Destruction Day, the Department helped to organize a special event at Headquarters, sponsored by the Permanent Mission of the Netherlands.

37. In accordance with the relevant resolutions of the General Assembly, the Department continued to sensitize public opinion on the question of Palestine

through its special information programme. On 18 and 19 June it held an international media encounter on the question of Palestine in Paris, at which international media representatives and experts discussed the status of the peace process and ways and means to break the deadlock. Ninth in a series launched in 1991, the encounter attracted wide international media coverage. The Department has scheduled a training programme at Headquarters for 10 Palestinian journalists and broadcasters, to be held in the autumn of 2001.

38. In the area of decolonization, the Department has continued to publicize the work of the Organization. It currently maintains a web page on decolonization on the United Nations web site. A new brochure highlighting the launch of the Second International Decade for the Eradication of Colonialism (2001-2010) is being issued.

39. As part of its ongoing campaign to promote the observance of the United Nations Year of Dialogue among Civilizations, the Department will produce a press kit highlighting the plenary meetings of the General Assembly on the Year, to be held on 3 and 4 December 2001. This will coincide with the issuance of a publication, prepared by a group of eminent persons appointed by the Secretary-General and led by his Personal Representative for the Year, about the dialogue among civilizations as a methodology facilitating a new paradigm for international relations. The Department, in association with the Personal Representative of the Secretary-General, has already produced seven public service announcements illustrating the work of individuals who have crossed the divide of difference to bring people together. They have been distributed to television networks worldwide, and are also available on the web page on the Year posted on the United Nations web site.

VI. United Nations information centres

40. During the past year, the network of United Nations information centres and services and United Nations offices continued to serve as the local voice of the Organization around the world. They disseminated information on the work and priority themes of the Organization to the general public, as well as to key partners, including the private sector, non-governmental organizations, representatives of the media, academics and students. A wide variety of public outreach activities were organized, such as

seminars, round tables, media briefings, press conferences, film screenings, exhibits, workshops and conferences, aimed at raising awareness and understanding of the United Nations among local communities. Information centres carried out an impressive number of activities in support of the special session of the General Assembly on HIV/AIDS. Altogether, 58 centres organized 170 special activities. Their efforts in reaching out not only to ministries, Government officials, the media, non-governmental organizations and AIDS-related civil society associations, but also to women, students and vulnerable groups, generated significant interest in the session in their respective areas. The centres were also resourceful in highlighting other significant United Nations events over the past year, such as the Third United Nations Conference on the Least Developed Countries, the Conference on the Illicit Trade in Small Arms and Light Weapons and the World Conference against Racism. For the latter, for example, a German press kit was produced by the United Nations information centres in Bonn and Vienna.

41. The Department has continued to strengthen the technological capacity of its information centres by providing equipment and training. During the biennium 2000-2001, it has approved a record number of training requests for the centres' staff and conducted a major upgrade of computer equipment. The provision of training in both information technologies and professional skills, complemented by scanners, digital cameras, compact disk writers and desktop publishing facilities, has allowed the centres to locally produce attractive and timely information materials. To facilitate local production, the Department is also providing the centres with the electronic versions of design layouts. Increasingly, the information centres have shared their technological know-how with key partners, for example by providing researchers with access to the Organization's databases or by training local media professionals in the retrieval of United Nations information from the Internet. In their commitment to harnessing the outreach capabilities of the Internet, a growing number of centres have developed their own web sites providing news and other information materials on United Nations themes and events, including local-language versions of major reports. At present, 40 centres maintain web sites, the most recent additions being those in Algiers, Ankara, Bogota, Cairo, Dhaka, La Paz, Ouagadougou, Rio de Janeiro, Tehran and Warsaw.

VII. Library and cartographic services

42. Through ongoing programmes and new initiatives, the Dag Hammarskjöld Library continues to reinforce its commitment to bridging the digital divide by placing major emphasis on web-related activities, the digitization of United Nations documents, inter-agency resource-sharing, the provision of extensive training programmes, the provision of multilingual access to written information and forging strategic partnerships throughout the United Nations system. UNBISnet (<http://unbisnet.un.org>), which comprises the Library's major databases, including its public catalogue, has received more than 700,000 hits since it was opened to the public, free of charge, in September 2000.

43. In keeping with the Organization's renewed emphasis on multilingualism, the Library launched the Arabic, Chinese and Russian versions of its own web page on 6 July 2001. The page entitled "United Nations documentation: research guide" (<http://www.un.org/Depts/dhl/resguide>) is being translated into all official languages; the Arabic and French versions have already been posted. The Library's thesaurus files have been completed in all official languages and are undergoing final editing. Through the issuance of the UNBIS Thesaurus in Arabic, Chinese and Russian, with projected availability on the Web in 2001, multilingual subject access to the Official Document System (ODS) and other United Nations documentation databases will have been achieved.

44. Pursuant to resolution 52/214 C, of 22 December 1997, the Library, in cooperation with the Information Technology Services Division of the Department of Management, continues the retrospective posting of pre-1993 parliamentary documentation to ODS. Security Council documents are available in English from 1985 onwards. The documentation of the General Assembly is available in English from the forty-first session, and in Arabic, French and Spanish from the forty-sixth session.

45. Paramount among inter-agency cooperative efforts is the United Nations System Electronic Information Acquisition Consortium, which centralizes the purchasing of online information products and services for more than 50 entities throughout the United Nations system. Initiated by the Library in 1998, the Consortium is now in its fourth subscription cycle and continues to effect significant cost savings.

Because of these cooperative purchase agreements, the Library can provide the permanent missions and United Nations offices worldwide with remote access to previously unaffordable electronic databases and services.

46. As at 30 June 2001, there were 394 United Nations depository libraries: 56 in Africa; 101 in Asia and the Pacific; 19 in Western Asia; 82 in Western Europe; 30 in Eastern Europe; 50 in Latin America and the Caribbean; and 56 in North America. Fourteen new libraries joined the system during the period from July 2000 to June 2001. In addition to training provided at Headquarters for visiting librarians, three regional workshops were held in 2000 (in Brussels, Islamabad and Moscow), and two in 2001 (in Mexico City and Rabat). Since January 2001, 35 depository libraries have converted their hard-copy entitlements of official records and documents into ODS access.

47. The Department continues to expand its cartographic and geographic services. Revised peacekeeping and general maps have been prepared, and new ones have been developed and posted on the cartographic web site in digital form for free access by Member States and the Secretariat. The Chief of the Cartographic Section continues to chair the Inter-agency United Nations Geographic Information Working Group, the objective of which is to coordinate the development and maintenance of a common United Nations geographic database. The Department began to develop this database in August 2001, in cooperation with the Department of Political Affairs, the Department of Peacekeeping Operations and the Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs. In accordance with the peace agreement between the Governments of Eritrea and Ethiopia signed on 12 December 2000 (A/55/686-S/2000/1183), the Chief of the Cartographic Section was appointed Secretary of the Boundary Commission.

VIII. Publishing activities

48. The Department makes every effort to ensure that its recurrent and other publications contain comprehensive and objective information about the major issues before the Organization. New technologies have enhanced the production process and made electronic versions possible. Through the Africa Recovery information programme, the Department provides focused outreach on economic developments

in Africa to the worldwide media, government officials and policy makers, as well as to scholars and other members of civil society. *Africa Recovery* magazine presents in-depth assessments of programmes, policies and supporting action taken by the United Nations, donors, African Governments and the peoples of Africa in order to give visibility to the United Nations New Agenda for the Development of Africa in the 1990s and the United Nations System-wide Special Initiative on Africa. The Department continues to promote the global campaign for development in Africa, along with its partners in the Economic Commission for Africa (ECA) and the Office of the Special Coordinator for Africa and the Least Developed Countries. It cooperated with UNAIDS and ECA to disseminate information on HIV/AIDS in Africa.

49. The fifty-second volume of the *Yearbook of the United Nations*, covering all the major activities of the United Nations during 1998, was published in April 2001. Work is currently under way on the 1999 and 2000 volumes, and very shortly a CD-ROM covering the first 50 volumes of the Yearbook will be available. The quarterly *UN Chronicle* has, over the past year, expanded its proven format of providing in-depth coverage of a wide range of international issues to include features, articles and interviews by eminent contributors, both within and outside the Organization. The March-May 2001 issue carried a special feature section entitled "Cities in the New Century: Welcome to the Urban Millennium", which provided background to the special session of the General Assembly on human settlements. The June-August 2001 issue featured, among other things, a special section entitled "Beyond Tolerance", containing a collection of articles relating to the World Conference against Racism. In addition, the online version of the *Chronicle* in English and French has continued to expand.

50. During the past year, *United Nations Development Business*, which is available both in print and online, has continued its twice-monthly publication in partnership with the World Bank, the Inter-American Development Bank, the African Development Bank, the Asian Development Bank and other leading lending institutions within and outside the United Nations system. The publication is issued in English, but also contains notices in French, Spanish and Portuguese. It continues to be the single most comprehensive and exclusive source of information on projects in a wide variety of sectors funded by the major development

banks and other important financial institutions, as well as the United Nations system and government agencies. Those projects assist the developing countries in procuring goods and services at internationally competitive prices.

51. The Department has updated a number of its publications, taking into account feedback from target audiences. An updated edition of the popular *Basic Facts about the United Nations* has been produced in English and French, with the Spanish edition close to completion. Selected elements of the new edition have been posted on the United Nations web site. A new edition of *The UN in Brief* has been published in the six official languages, with portions posted on the web site.

52. Promotional activities by the Department's sales and marketing operation have resulted in the continued growth in sales of United Nations publications. There has been a significant expansion in the Asian and Pacific region, where sales have doubled in the past three years. The English-language version of the *United Nations Publications Catalogue, 2001-2002*, containing over a thousand titles, has been completed, and, in addition, catalogues were produced in Arabic, Russian and Spanish for targeted markets in cooperation with sales agents. The Department also continues to help promote the publications of a number of United Nations funds, programmes and specialized agencies. In the area of product development, a similar level of cooperation has been evident in the Secretariat, resulting in new products, most notably the statistical database UNSTATS, produced by the Department of Economic and Social Affairs, which is now available on the Internet. An increase was seen in the number of new contracts for co-publication, translation and reprinting of United Nations publications, with over 40 new projects being concluded with, among others, Chinese, Japanese and Russian publishers. United Nations titles were also published in German and, for the first time, in the Bosnian and Serbian languages.

IX. Observations

53. The work of the Department of Public Information is not an end in itself. Its *raison d'être* is to help fulfil the substantive goals of the United Nations which, as the Secretary-General has repeatedly underscored, cannot be met without garnering public support for the Organization. The Department's efforts

to create an informed understanding of the Organization's work and purposes aims to ensure that the substantive work of the United Nations succeeds by ensuring that a global message reaches a worldwide audience. In so doing, the Department is working with all the departments and organizational units of the Secretariat to give them a public face and to help them to formulate their messages and disseminate them around the world. The programmes and activities detailed in the present report serve to illustrate how the Department is re-energizing its work, enhancing its efficiency and expanding its outreach to bring the United Nations message to the public around the globe.

54. The challenges facing the United Nations in conveying information about its activities to the world today should not be underestimated. The world is already suffering from "information overload"; the sheer volume of material that assails the public, from newspapers, radio, television and now the Internet, means that we are seeking to be heard amidst a cacophony. The subjects we work in, and seek to promote, are not necessarily the most interesting ones to the lay person: there is a limit to how much space an editor is therefore willing to allocate to issues of fundamental importance to the United Nations, from development to climate change. We are constantly seeking to raise concern about the problems of the poor and the strife-torn in the media of the rich and the tranquil, and constantly face the unspoken question from the developed world: why should we care?

55. The problem of the relatively low level of interest in our messages is compounded by the declining coverage of world affairs by the media in the developed world (a fact starkly apparent in the United States of America, where the 65 per cent reduction in the time allocated to world affairs by the major networks since 1980 has been amply documented). Trends in communications also make our task more difficult: to pick just one example, broadcasting is increasingly being supplanted by narrow-casting, with a proliferation of channels and media outlets all carrying increasingly specialized information to increasingly narrow audiences. No longer do we live in a world in which almost everyone who matters in every country sits down at the same hour to watch the same news broadcast. Reaching the public at large is now a much more complex task than ever before.

56. In this context, the Department of Public Information is vigorously using every means at its

disposal to be heard. To this end, the enormous possibilities presented by the communications revolution have helped it to develop an infrastructure capable of the instantaneous transmission of text, image and voice messages from the Organization to the world, especially in providing immediate access for developing countries to United Nations news. Increased partnerships with media organizations, non-governmental organizations and other elements of civil society have ensured a "multiplier effect" for the United Nations message at the local level, as has the important work of the network of United Nations information centres around the world.

57. In sum, the Organization is deeply conscious, at the highest levels, of the importance of its information work, and is determined to continue to improve its efforts in this vital area, within the limited resources available to it, so as to ensure that the substantive purposes and goals of the United Nations are understood and fulfilled.
