### Implementation of the Programme of Action of the ICPD, with emphasis on changing age structures and sustainable development

The Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development is global in scope and relevance, but its implementation needs to take into account the economic, social and environmental diversity across countries and regions. As part of agenda item 3, this meeting will focus on the implementation of the Programme of Action of the ICPD with an emphasis on changing age structures and sustainable development. It will consist of national voluntary presentations, an expert panel and an interactive discussion. Panellists will present introductory remarks, followed by national voluntary presentations and responses from the panellists and Member States. Eight Member States (China, Finland, Ghana, Indonesia, Mexico, Norway, Republic of the Sudan, and the Philippines) will make in-depth national presentations. The expert panellists will respond to the national presentations followed by a Q&A period with Member States. The discussion will be moderated.
