# **Conclusions of the 2010 GFMD Chair**



## 2010 Chair's objectives

- •The 2010 GFMD sought to promote a broader understanding of migration, through evidence-based discussions.
- •Mexico acted with transparency to build confidence among all interested parties to openly discuss concepts such as:
  - irregular migration
  - human development
  - migrants' contributions to development
  - climate change and migration

Central Theme: "Partnerships for migration and human development: shared prosperity – shared responsibility"



#### **Preparatory process**

- The Chair undertook a series of informal consultations on a new discussion framework.
  - Three meetings of the Friends of the Forum and 5 meetings of the Steering Group were held in Geneva to prepare for Puerto Vallarta.
- •The background documents for the seven sessions were prepared from March to September by governments, international organizations and government delegates.
  - Ad hoc working groups on "Protecting and empowering migrants for development" and "Policy coherence, data and research" also carried out studies and workshops.
- •Mexico received contributions to cover the participation of experts and delegates from developing countries of more than €800,000 from Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Spain, United States, France, Israel, Italy, Norway, Netherlands, Portugal, United Kingdom, Sweden, Switzerland, the MacArthur Foundation, and the IOM.



## International Organizations' Cooperation

- •Mexico worked closely with the Global Migration Group (GMG) to open new spaces for international organizations in the Forum.
  - The GMG was closely involved in the preparation of the sessions' documents and also organized the symposium "Overcoming barriers: building partnerships for migration and human development'.
- •The UN Country Team for Migration established a Taskforce to coordinate their efforts.
- •IOM assisted Mexico with delegates' travel arrangements and Mexican visa applications.
- •Mexico is grateful for the support received form the UN in preparation of the Puerto Vallarta meeting and looks forward to a continued collaboration.



## **Civil Society**

- •At the invitation of the Mexican Chair, the BBVA-Bancomer Foundation coordinated the organization of the Civil Society Days.
- •More than 400 delegates and observers from 80 countries attended this meeting, along with representatives from 33 countries.
  - 12 working sessions took place, on issues such as human security and the protection of human rights, and migrant empowerment.
- •The Common Space was an innovative and successful approach to strengthen government-civil society interaction. Informal and open discussions took place through panels comprised by 2 representatives from governments, 2 from international organizations and 2 from civil society. The topics analyzed were:
  - Improving public perceptions of migration
  - Migration and human development: enhancing partnerships



## **Puerto Vallarta Meeting**

- •The Government Meeting was held on November 10-11.
- •Over 131 UN Member-States participated in the Government Meeting, with 39 international organizations as observers. Assistance was approximately 650 participants, including:
  - 8 ministers
  - 26 vice-ministers
  - UN High Commissioner for Human Rights
  - Director General of the IOM
  - SG Special Representative for Migration



#### **Roundtable 1. Partnerships for Migration and Development**

#### **Main recommendations:**

- •The respect for the human rights of migrants, regardless of their immigration status, is an absolute principle.
- •The elimination of erroneous or biased perceptions requires the broad dissemination of knowledge.
- Origin and destination countries should avoid the criminalization of migrants.
- •Countries need to have a comprehensive policy and programs for returning migrants, both voluntary and forced cases.
- Governments should consider circular or temporary migration schemes.
- •Irregular migration should remain on the agenda of the GFMD.



#### Roundtable 2. Human Mobility and Human Development

#### Main recommendations:

- •The ratification of UN Conventions on the rights of the child and their national implementation ought to be promoted.
- •Gender-sensitive guidelines on policies, programs and budgets, with appropriate indicators, should be developed. The impact of migration on families should also be considered.
- •The **portability of pensions** and other social rights ought to be considered, as well as cost-effective health care models.
- •Cooperation mechanisms between countries of origin and destination are important to improve job-matching and skills recognition.



# Roundtable 3. Policy and institutional coherence to address the relationship between migration and development

#### Main recommendations:

- Indicators of the impact of migration on development are needed, as well as updated migration profiles.
- •On climate change and migration, dialogue at the local, regional and global levels is important. Discussion of an appropriate legal and institutional framework should be considered.
- •Regional consultative processes (RCPs) and inter-regional fora (IRFs) contribute to greater policy and institutional coherence at the national level and reinforce a whole-of-government approach.



#### The future of the GFMD

- •There is a broad room for improvement, but the GFMD does constitute a space to share and identify good practices and promote collaboration.
- •The GFMD should continue building on the results of the previous sessions and gradually incorporate innovative perspectives and new topics.
- •The participation of UN agencies in the GFMD process should be strengthened trough action oriented activities on the ground. International organizations are important partners in the implementation of GFMD recommendations.
- In a special session on the future of the Forum, governments agreed to begin an assessment of whether the GFMD is conducive to productive dialogue and tangible, action-oriented outcomes.



## Migration and development agenda

- •The 2011 GMDF will have a different format but will maintain an actionoriented focus. Mexico has extended its full support to the Swiss Chair.
- •There are upcoming important opportunities to further support the GFMD.
  - 2011 UNGA Thematic Debate on migration and development.
  - 2013 High Level Dialogue to evaluate the achievements of the GFMD and to influence its future.
- •The involvement of UN international organizations in this process will be key to ensure a balanced and coherent approach. The GMG has an important role to play in translating informal recommendations into concrete guidelines.
