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### Projecting fertility in the 2000 Revision



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
#### Principles followed in projecting total fertility

 Ensure that the decline of fertility decelerates as total fertility nears replacement level


Take account of fertility level to establish pace of decline

 Take account of observed pace of decline over recent periods to establish pace of decline in the first part of the projection period


# Fitting the relation between total fertility and fertility decrements



### Median and quartiles




#### Median, used in 2002 Revision
