This year's GHA Report was launched on Wednesday 20th July at 8.15 a.m., at the humanitarian segment of the ECOSOC substantive session at the Palais des Nations, Geneva.

The presentation Jan Kellett's presentation of GHA Report 2011 was divided into three key sections:

Facts and figures

The latest figures were provided for:

- International humanitarian response, the highest year on record
- Humanitarian aid from governments
- Private contributions
- Top ten recipients and top ten donors, which generally remain the same groupings.

Humanitarian trends

Latest figures show that:

- Humanitarian aid is rising
- More donors are participating, notably non-DAC donors
- But, demand is rising
- Levels of unmet need are increasing
- Cost of humanitarian aid is rising (i.e. food and energy).

Looking ahead:

- Which types of emergencies will be funded?
- How will donors prioritise (declining?) aid budgets?
- Who will be most affected by choices?

Key messages

• Humanitarian aid is being stretched to respond to different types of emergencies in different

contexts, and

- Beyond immediate life-saving towards development and other activity
- Humanitarian financing needs to be viewed alongside other resources, in order to ensure better planning and coordination
- Increased transparency is essential for this.
