This event intended to create a multi-stakeholder dialogue on how transparency, open data and accountability can enhance the impact of the Post-2015 agenda. By showcasing existing initiatives, particularly in the Netherlands and Bolivia, the audience could see on how open data provides a tool for governments, international financial institutions and civil society to monitor and better coordinate finance for development resources.

The panel discussed what can be done in order to make transparency and open data an effective tool to achieve sustainable development outcomes, while exploring how this can be built into the post-2015 development agenda. They also specifically attempted to address the following questions:
