"Development cooperation in a post-2015 era: sustainable development for all"

24-25 October 2013

Montreux, Switzerland

PROGRAMME

As the world is reaching environmental and social tipping points, the post-2015 development agenda will have to address two central tasks: completing any unfinished business of the Millennium Development Goals, with their primary focus on eradicating poverty; and putting the world on a more sustainable development path. It will thus have to be both unified in its content and universal in its applicability to all countries.

A transformative global development agenda is needed and is emerging. To effectively support its implementation, development cooperation will have to evolve. There is a strong need to assess all available forms of financing and emphasize partnerships, across stakeholders and sectors. The post-2015 development agenda will have important implications on the ways actors in development cooperation will operate. Instruments, channels and the division of labour will have to adapt. Development cooperation will have to continue to support poor and vulnerable communities facing sustainable development challenges, while mobilizing resources to address global challenges, such as climate change and managing global commons.

The DCF Switzerland High-Level Symposium will provide an opportunity to discuss how development cooperation can help advance sustainable development for all in a post-2015 era. It will examine the implications of a post-2015 development agenda that is both unified and universal. It will focus on key issues such as financing of development cooperation, including allocation, ways to mobilize additional public and private sources of development finance, promoting an enabling environment and roles and responsibilities of different actors. It will also discuss defining features of an enhanced global monitoring and accountability framework.

Following its multi-stakeholder tradition, the DCF will bring together, in an informal and open dialogue, high-level officials and experts in development cooperation and development finance from governments, parliaments, multilateral and civil society organizations, private philanthropic organizations and the private sector. The Symposium will serve as a key preparatory event for the DCF ministerial-level meeting to take place in New York in July 2014. Its outcome will make an immediate contribution to the ongoing deliberations on the post-2015 development agenda.
