I have the honour to speak on behalf of the Member States of the European Union.

Mr Chairman,

As we have said before, the EU Member States strongly support the basic principles of the civilian capacity initiative and welcome the cross-cutting effort embodied by the initiative aimed at improving the United Nations' support to capacity building in countries emerging from conflict. We therefore welcome the latest report of the Secretary General and are grateful for the updated information it provides.

Finally, Mr Chairman, I would like to take this opportunity to thank ASG Sarah Cliffe and her team for their hard work over the last couple of years and their valuable contribution to the UN's efforts to enhance civilian capacity in post-conflict environments.
