The United Nations Public-Private Alliance for Rural Development (UNPPA) is one of a series of recent initiatives by the UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) to help achieve the Council's multiple roles of encouraging economic and social advancement; promoting collaboration and cooperation; and reviewing the results of such efforts within and outside the United Nations system that emphasizes the positive role business can play in development. It derives from the 2003 ECOSOC Ministerial Declaration which encourages alliances and partnerships for rural development. In July 2004 the Council recognized Madagascar as the first pilot country of this effort, and selected the Dominican Republic as the second pilot country in July 2005

MISSION

UN Alliance identifies, highlights and promotes replication of successful business policies and practices that are profitable and promote social and economic advancement of people in rural areas.

OBJECTIVES

- Work as a catalyst and facilitator for the creation of partnerships;
- Identify and promote business and commercial relations in several activities:
- Provide a platform for collaboration; and
- ♦ Bring the results of these efforts to the attention of the international community.

FUNCTIONS

UN Alliance promotes business, stimulates entrepreneurial capacity-building. It also encourages investments, commerce and related activities for sustainable rural development by developing multistakeholder partnerships. Ultimately, UN Alliance's activities help in efforts to achieve the MDGs.

ALLIANCE-MADAGASCAR

Alliance-Madagascar is a public-interest organization, recognized by government decree and statute. The Prime Minister chairs meetings of the highlevel participants of the four stakeholder groups — government, business, NGO and financial/technical communities — who comprise the General Assembly and Board of Directors of "Alliance-Madagascar".
