Possible discussion questions

The below discussion questions have been developed to facilitate dialogue in the seminar:

- 1. Which emerging issues/global challenges are likely to significantly impact the future role of the UN development system in international cooperation for development?
- 2. What are the key drivers of change in (a) international development cooperation and (b) the UN development system?
- 3. What kind of change in (a) strategic positioning, (b) operational effectiveness, (c) delivery of results and (d) accountability, is needed if the UN development system is to respond effectively to the emerging issues/ global challenges?
- 4. What are the most important likely shifts in the thematic areas, geographic focus, and modalities for delivery of development cooperation and what do they tell us about the changing role of the UN development system?
- 5. What are the key UN development system's relative strengths in providing support to countries in transition from relief to development? How should UN's assistance evolve to better support those countries?
- 6. How is the growth in South-South and triangular cooperation likely to impact the future role of the UN development system?
- 7. What kind of challenges and opportunities does the expanding role of civil society and private sector organizations in development cooperation pose for the UN development system?
