**Proposed Programmes for Inclusion in 10-Year  
Framework on Sustainable Consumption and  
Production**

---

**Background Paper No.14  
CSD19/2011/BP14**

The CSD-19 IPM held between 28 February and 4 March 2011 in New York concluded with a draft Negotiating text [[draft negotiation text CSD19](#)] that calls for the establishment of a 10-Year Framework (10YFP) of Programmes on Sustainable Consumption and Production (2011-2021), one that provides a common vision inspired by Agenda 21, the Rio Declaration, and the JPOI, that is ambitious, aiming towards the highest common denominator, that catalyzes high-level political support, that is broadly participatory, engaging all stakeholders including the private sector, and that is feasible and actionable (para 65). Para 76 of the text lists a set of key programme areas that could be included in the 10YFP.

Here we map these key programmes against those that had been submitted through a preliminary collection exercise conducted between 7 October and 26 November 2010, as well as those submitted following the Panama meeting as well as those consolidated by Agencies and regional commissions following the 14 April interagency meeting organized by UNDESA.

Following the Panama intersessional meeting on the 10-year framework, held in January 2011, we contacted programme proponents to request information on experience accumulated to date under each programme or initiative already in progress, as well as lessons learned. This information is presented below. First, a clarification of terminology used: framework, programme, initiative and activity. In the simplest terms, the broadest concept is that of a Framework, which includes a set of strategic Programmes, which are relatively broad and each of which may contain several more specific or focused initiatives. The programmes and initiatives thereunder are to be implemented through a set of focused activities.
