

Biographical Notes

Mr. Nelson Barbosa Filho received his PhD in Economics from the New School for Social Research in New York. He is currently Deputy Secretary of Economics at the Brazilian Ministry of Finance and Professor at the Federal University of Rio de Janeiro (UFRJ). He worked as Deputy Chief Economic Adviser at the Brazilian Ministry of Budget, Planning and Management and Deputy Secretary of Macroeconomic Policy at the Ministry of Finance, and as Advisor to the President of the National Bank of Social and Economic Development (BNDES). He specializes in macroeconomics and economic development.

Mr. Carlos Braga (Brazil) joined the World Bank in 1991 as an Economist in the International Economics Department. Since then, he held managerial positions in the Energy, Mining, Telecommunications, Global ICT (infoDev) and Information Solutions Groups of the World Bank. Most recently, he was Senior Advisor in the International Trade Department, based in Geneva. His current position at the World Bank is Director of the Department for Economic Management and Debt Reduction. Mr. Braga holds a PhD (1984) in Economics from the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign, USA.

Ms. Nilufer Cagatay (Turkey) is Professor of Economics and a faculty member of the Middle East Studies and Women's Studies Programs at the University of Utah. Her research has focused on: gender and development; international trade theories; and engendering macroeconomic and international trade theories and policies. Between 1997 and 2000, she worked as Economic Adviser at UNDP's Social Development and Poverty Elimination Division. Ms. Cagatay received her BA in Economics and Political Science from Yale University and her MA and PhD in Economics from Stanford University.

Mr. Mushtaq Khan (Bangladesh) is Professor of Economics at the School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London, UK. His undergraduate studies were at Oxford (Exhibitioner at Corpus Christi College). In 1998, he was commissioned by the Norwegian Foreign Ministry—sponsor of the 1993 Oslo Peace Accord—to investigate aspects of Palestinian state formation and governance. His areas of specialization include economic development and governance. He has published widely and was recipient of the Frank Cass Prize in 2005 for two essays on the theme "Democratisation". He contributed to UNCTAD report "The Palestinian war-torn economy: aid, development and state formation" (2006). He holds a PhD from Cambridge University, UK.

Mr. John Sullivan is Executive Director of the Center for International Private Enterprise (CIPE), an affiliate of the US Chamber of Commerce. As Associate Director of the Democracy Program, he helped to establish both CIPE and the National Endowment for Democracy in 1983. Mr. Sullivan joined the US Chamber in 1977 in the Public Affairs Department as a specialist in business and economic education. He received a PhD in Political Science from the University of Pittsburgh. He is also an adjunct faculty member at Johns Hopkins University, School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS), as well as at George Mason University Graduate School of Public Affairs.
