Greetings from Malawi; my name is Mafa Chipeta, contacting you as a consultant for the UNFF Secretariat-managed independent Assessment of the International Arrangement on Forests in Preparation for the Midterm Review of its Effectiveness by the UN Forum on Forests. I have been retained by the UNFF Secretariat to contribute material under topic I (Involvement of regional and subregional partners) and topic J (Involvement of major groups and other relevant stakeholders). - Formulation and approval by the eight ACTO Member Countries (Bolivia, Brazil, Colombia, Ecuador, Guyana, Peru, Suriname, and Venezuela) of the "Regional Forest Program for the Amazon Basin and Region". This program is aligned with the SDGs and the Global Forest Goals.
- Formulation and technical approval by the eight ACTO Member Countries of the
   "Memorandum of Understanding on Cooperation and Mutual Assistance for
   Integrated Fire Management among ACTO Member Countries (MOU MIF)" and
   development of actions for the formation of the "Amazon Network for Integrated Fire
   Management".
- Progress in the implementation of the Forest Module of the Amazon Regional
  Observatory (ARO). The ARO is an Amazon Information Reference Center that
  facilitates the flow and exchange of information between institutions, government
  authorities, the scientific community, academia, and civil society in the Amazon
  countries of the Amazon Cooperation Treaty Organization (ACTO). The purpose of
  the Forestry Module is to integrate official information on forests in the Amazon
  territories of ACTO Member Countries.

- Presentation of the next regional report, incorporating advances in the implementation of the "Regional Forestry Program for the Amazon Basin and Region" that will benefit the IAF.
- Develop a financing strategy for the ACTO Forestry Program to the Global Forest Finance Facilitation Network GFFFN and manage the participation of the eight ACTO Member Countries.
- Institutionalize at the regional level the Dialogue of National Forestry Authorities in the Amazon Region and promote the institutional interaction of national authorities related to forestry in the Amazon Region as defined in Component 1 of the "Regional Forestry Program for the Amazon Basin and Region".

What do you consider to be the <u>top 3 key (a) achievements</u> and (b) <u>ambitions</u> of your Regional and Subregional Partner Group in **promoting practical action and/or investment into SFM** in line with the ambitions of the IAF (e.g., under its Strategic Plan for Forests 2017-2030)?

### A. ACTO's ACHIEVEMENTS:

- Support for the development of the 1st Virtual Forum on the potential of NTFPs for a Bioeconomy in Latin America and the Caribbean "BioForetALC" (March 2022).
- Within the framework of the Cooperation Agreement in force between ACTO and the Inter-American Institute for Cooperation on Agriculture (IICA), the PS/ACTO is contributing to the development of one of the sections of the "Biennial Report on the State and Prospects of the Bioeconomy in Latin America and the Caribbean", an initiative that is being coordinated by IICA, and which will have contributions from the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) and the International Center for Tropical Agriculture (CIAT), among others. The section being developed by the PS/ACTO addresses the use of natural products in the Amazon Region.
- Joint work with the CITES Authorities and Forestry Authorities of the ACTO MCs for the formation
  of Working Groups within the framework of the activities of the regional consultancy "Support for
  the implementation of CITES for Amazon tree species".

### B. ACTO's AMBITION:

- Develop a financing strategy for the ACTO Forest Program to the Global Forest Finance
   Facilitation Network GFFFN, and management for the participation of the eight ACTO Member Countries.
- Regional forest monitoring and harmonization and uniformity of regional criteria in the Amazon Region (Component 2 of the Program on Forests).

- Implementation of Criteria and Indicators for Sustainable Forest Management in the Amazon Region (Component 2 of the Forestry Program).
- Carry out a regional forest inventory of both timber and non-timber forest products (NTFPs).

What <u>top 3 successes</u> has your Regional and Subregional Partner Group achieved in more fully **engaging the private sector and philanthropic entities** in your work and (especially) supporting implementation of the IAF ambitions by civil society and member states?

### A. ACTO's ACHIEVEMENTS:

- The Amazon Regional Observatory (ACTO 11.2021) has been made available to interested parties, both from the private sector and philanthropic entities, with timely and accurate information related, among others, to forests and biodiversity, as well as indigenous peoples.
- The ARO's Micro, Small and Medium Enterprise Module (MYPIMES) is currently being implemented. The purpose of this platform is to consolidate, through the development of a Virtual Regional Information Window, all the work done to strengthen sustainable/sustainable management initiatives and traceability mechanisms for Amazon CITES species and forest products other than timber (NTFPs). It is expected to be completed in the first half of 2023. It will provide information on existing and potential markets for Amazon products, with updated online and automatic information on the historical behavior of these markets and product prices; and a mechanism for linking producers and buyers of Amazon products linked to CITES species (linkage with local, national, regional, and global fairs and platforms).
- The private sector and philanthropic entities can access the Regional Platform for Exchange and Knowledge (PRIC 2019) that among others offers training and virtual courses on SFM; promotes the systematization and exchange of experiences on practices and technologies of indigenous peoples, local communities and other tribal communities on sustainable/sustainable forest management; and Identify and promote the articulation of technological supply and innovation in forest management of international entities.
- Training and support to the ACTO MCs (i) in the development of the Non-detriment Findings (NDF) required by Appendix II of CITES for Cedrela spp. and (ii) implementation of CITES for tree species in the Amazon Region.

What are your key suggestions for sourcing reliable funding for continuing participation of your Regional and Subregional Partner Group in IAF dialogue and collective sponsorship by MGs of fora for IAF/SFM-related dialogues?

- Promotion of the importance and impacts of the participation of the Regional and Sub-regional Groups in the IAF dialogue, based on the regional forest programs and work plans developed and approved by the regional organizations in conjunction with their member countries.
- Development of financial proposals with projections of amounts to be funded by UN Member States for the development of IAF/MFS related dialogue forums.
- Leverage virtual platforms for the development of IAF/MFS-related dialogue forums.
- Develop a funding strategy for the ACTO Forestry Program to the Global Forest Finance Facilitation Network GFFFN, and management for the participation of the eight ACTO Member Countries.
- Formulation of projects to address the implementation of specific strategic actions.
- Have funded projects evaluated with indicators to identify their contribution to the IAF.
- Develop a funding strategy for the ACTO Forestry Program to the Global Forest Finance Facilitation Network GFFFN, and management for the participation of the eight ACTO Member Countries.
- Formulation of projects to address the implementation of specific strategic actions.
- Have funded projects evaluated with indicators to identify their contribution to the IAF.

What are your Regional and Subregional Partner Group's **most useful experiences in partnering with selected key IAF players**, including especially (a) Member Country Governments, (b) the Collaborative

Partnership on Forests (CPF), and (c) Regional and Subregional Partners in all or selected regions of the world, with top 3 suggestions each for improving them further?

### (a) Member Countries Governments

ACTO is an intergovernmental organization formed by the eight Amazon countries: Bolivia, Brazil, Colombia, Ecuador, Guyana, Peru, Suriname, and Venezuela, which signed the Amazon Cooperation Treaty (ACT), becoming the only socio-environmental bloc in Latin America.

Strategic partners: various ministries or institutions responsible for the MCs, such as Ministries of Foreign Affairs, Ministries of the Environment, Forestry Directorates and other authorities and entities of the eight Member Countries.

ACTO works through the coordination and articulation of the Permanent Secretariat (PS/ACTO) whose main roles and functions are to facilitate the exchange, knowledge, cooperation, and joint projection among the Member Countries to fulfill the mandates of the Amazon Cooperation Treaty. Therefore, it is:

- Articulating: consensus is generated among Member Countries to enable the implementation of activities, programs and projects involving national, regional, and international actors.
- Facilitator: establishes spaces for political and technical dialogue among the Member Countries to ensure that the mandates granted are fulfilled, including issues of interest in international forums such as those related to climate change, forests, biological diversity, and international trade in endangered species of wild fauna and flora.
- Coordinator: regionally administers and manages the execution of activities, programs and projects based on the mandates of the Member Countries.
- Manager of regional and international cooperation support: financial sources are identified to carry
  out specific activities of a regional nature that have been entrusted to it based on the priorities of
  the Member Countries, with full respect for national sovereignty and promoting South-South
  cooperation.
- Executor of programs and projects: progress is being made in the process of consolidating ACTO as an agency for executing regional programs and projects.
- Generator of regional information: regional reference information for the Amazon is produced from an exchange of experiences and knowledge of the Member Countries.
- Promoter of actions: it strengthens the institutional and management capacity of the Member Countries according to their requirements.
- Facilitator of participation and strategic alliances: it promotes the effective participation of the Amazon population and actors through dialogue and broad, democratic, intercultural, transparent, pluralistic, diverse, and independent interaction, strengthening the construction of strategic alliances.

## (b) Collaborative Partnership on Forests (CPF)

ACTO does not belong to the CPF, however, to a greater or lesser degree, it has interacted with most of the organizations that make up the CPF and has maintained close collaboration with some of them over the years.

# REMINDER OF QUESTIONS YOU ALREADY RECEIVED [as part of the consolidated questionnaire you received from the UNFF18 Chairperson on 9<sup>th</sup> August 2022]

**Question I-1:** In your view, what are the top three areas in which regional and subregional partners have made the most important contributions to SFM policy development and dialogue since the 15<sup>th</sup> session of the UNFF?

The three main areas in which regional and sub-regional partners have made the most significant contributions to policy formulation and dialogue on sustainable forest management since UNFF15 are:

- Forest governance
- Reduction of greenhouse gas emissions by decreasing rates of forest degradation and increasing forest restoration.
- Sustainable forest management that promotes regional, national, and local development and contributes to the livelihoods of local populations.

The Amazon Cooperation Treaty Organization has been consistently and permanently supporting the achievement of the Global Forest Goals.

Other examples are FAO (Headquarters and Regional Forestry Commission Secretariats), the Asia-Pacific Network for Sustainable Forest Management and Rehabilitation (APFNet) and the International Network for Bamboo and Rattan (INBAR). Also, ITTO.

Question I-3: Given the power for good of the business and philanthropic communities, what are the key efforts of regional and subregional partners to partner with them? [both within and outside the Business Council for Sustainable Development (UN-BCSD)]

While the business and philanthropic communities provide financial and technical inputs for actions on forests, in some cases the acceptance of such inputs by regional organizations may be limited by the regulations, legislation, political will and sovereignty of the organizations' member countries.
