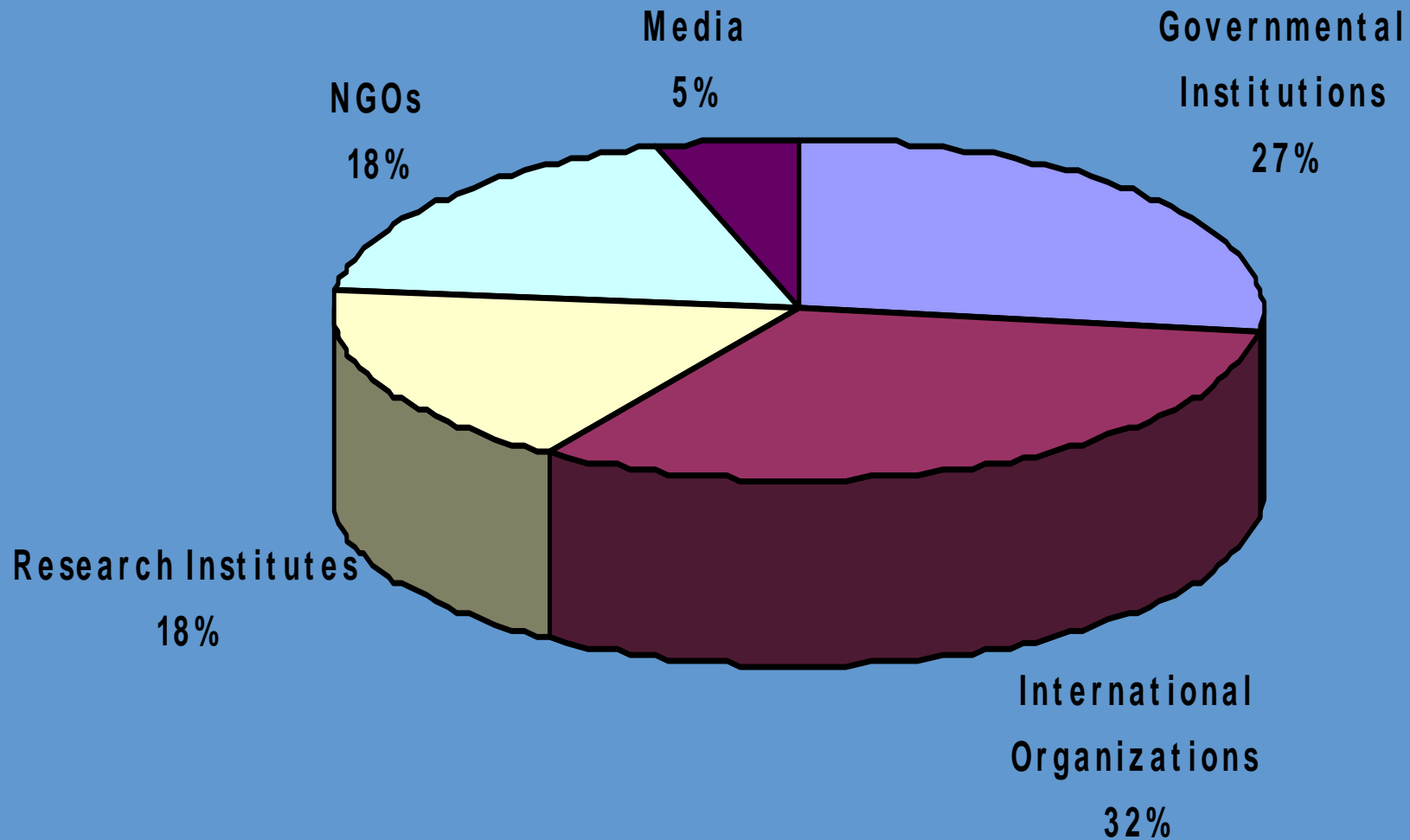


## Data:

- Information collected from 113 sources reporting trafficking cases in more than 450 publications from all over the world
- About 5,000 accounts of trafficking recorded between 1996 and 2003
- Detailed information on 161 countries

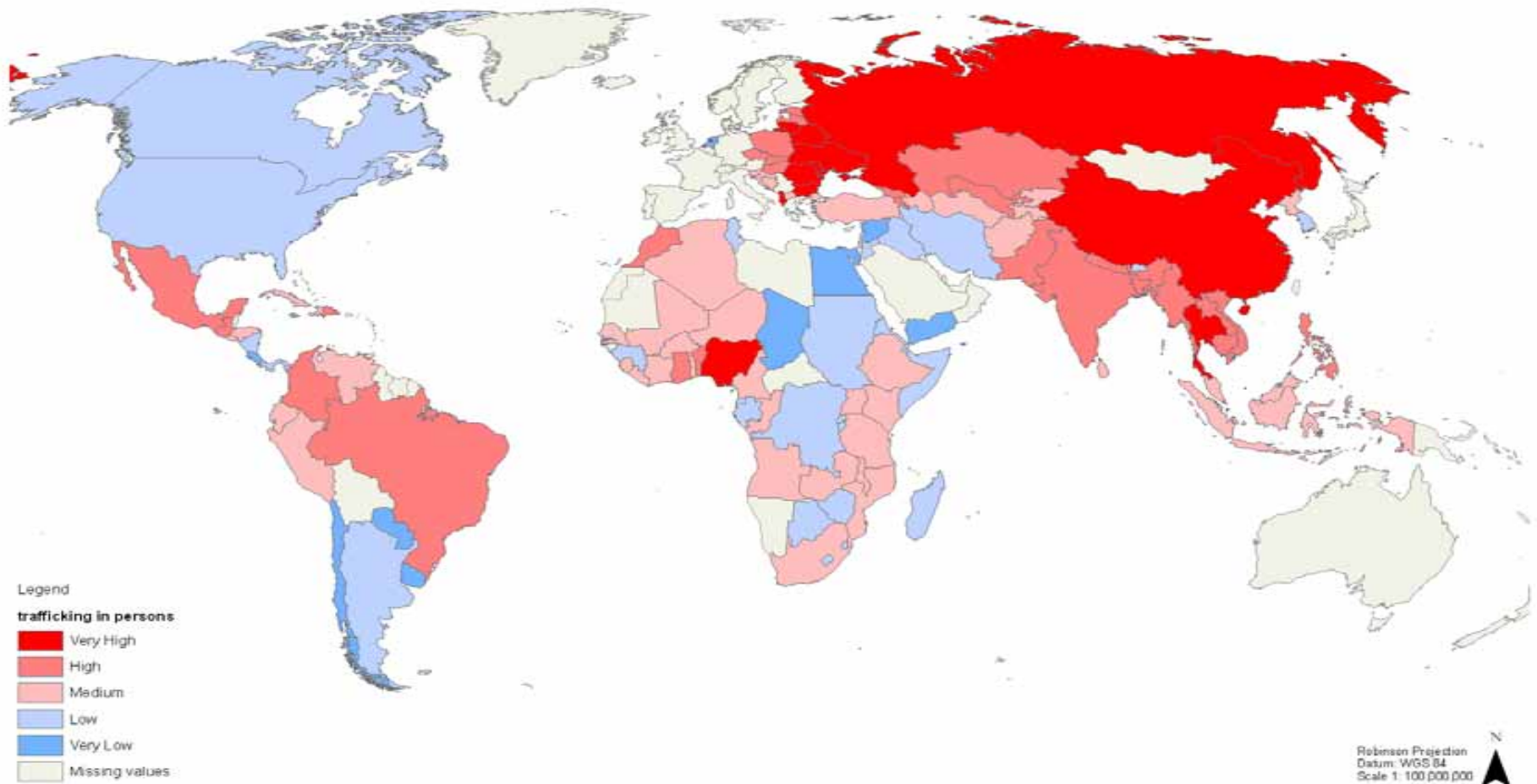


## Database includes information on:

- Persons trafficked from, through and to a country
- Trafficking routes
- Trafficking for sexual exploitation or forced labour
- Nationality, sex, and age of victims and offenders
- Number of investigations, prosecutions and convictions per country



# Origin countries of trafficking in persons

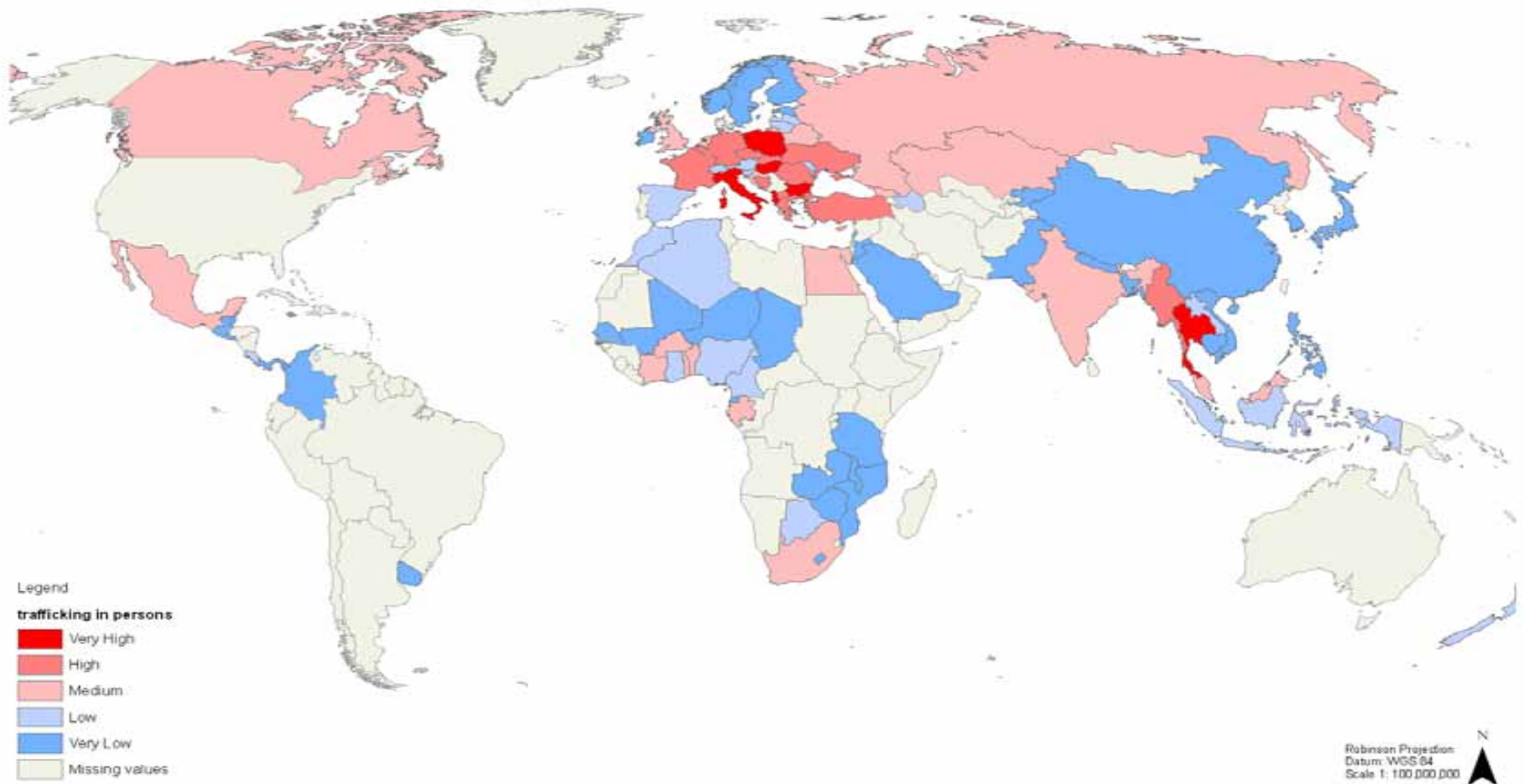

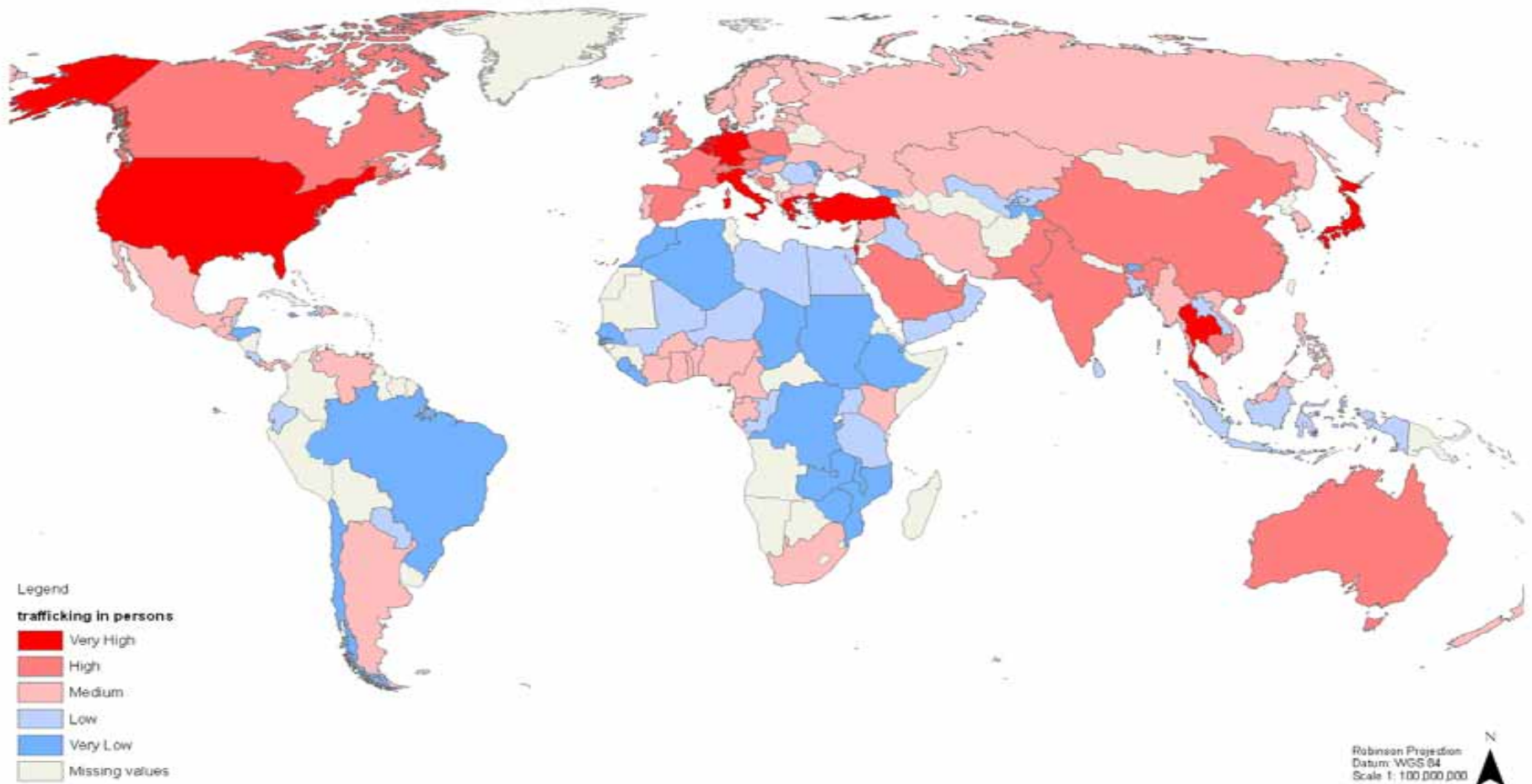

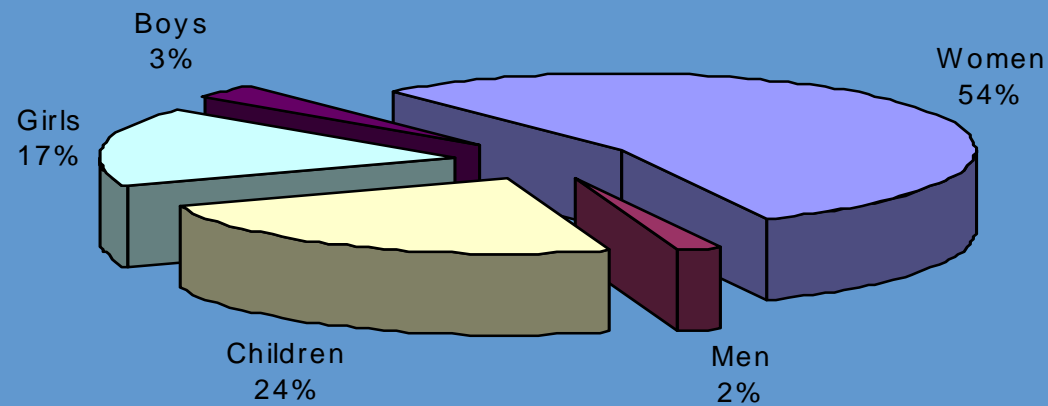


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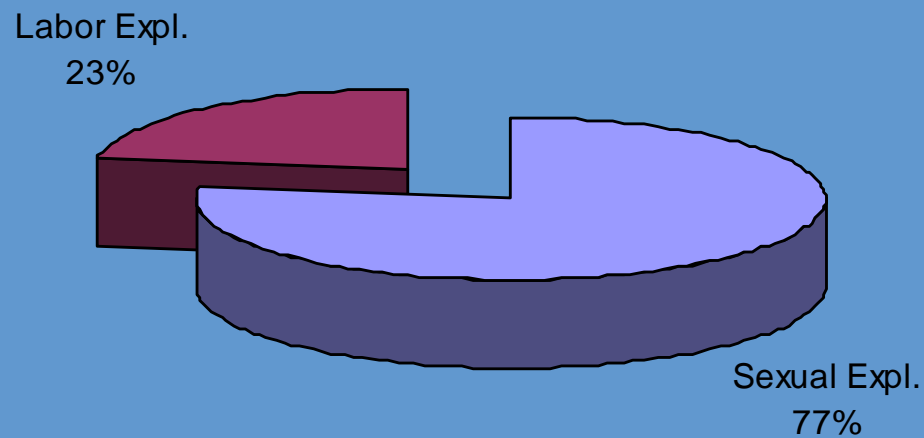

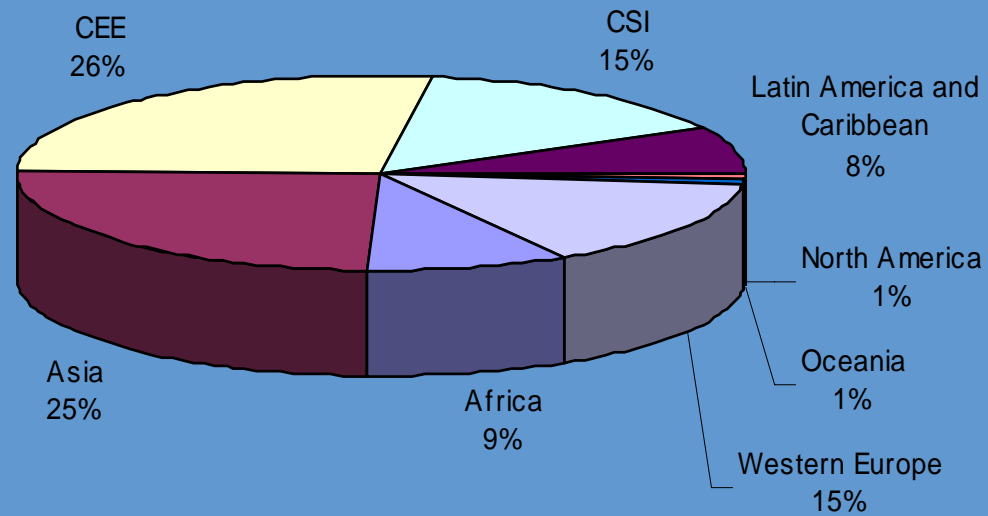


# Type of exploitation



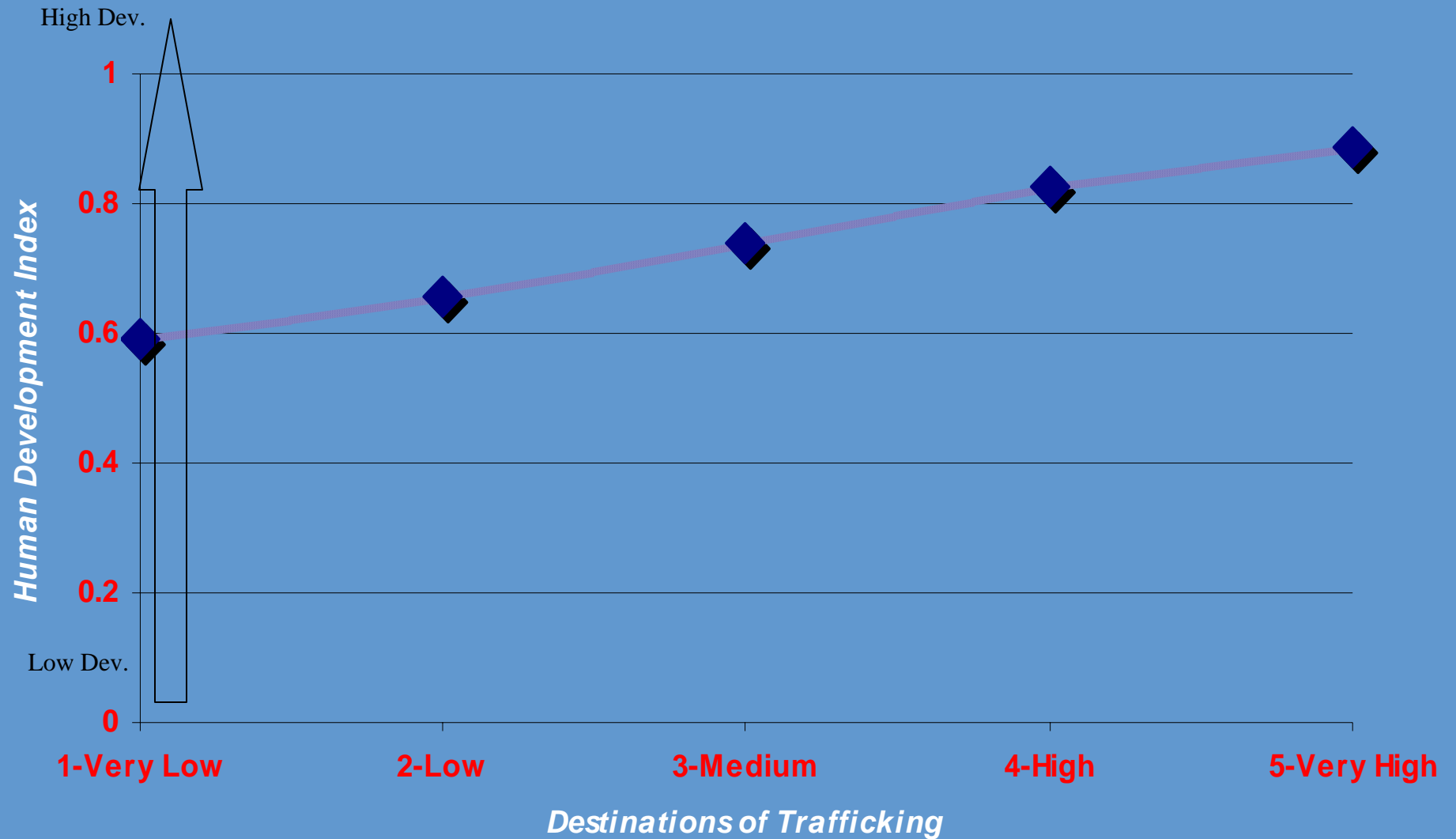


# Offenders Nationality

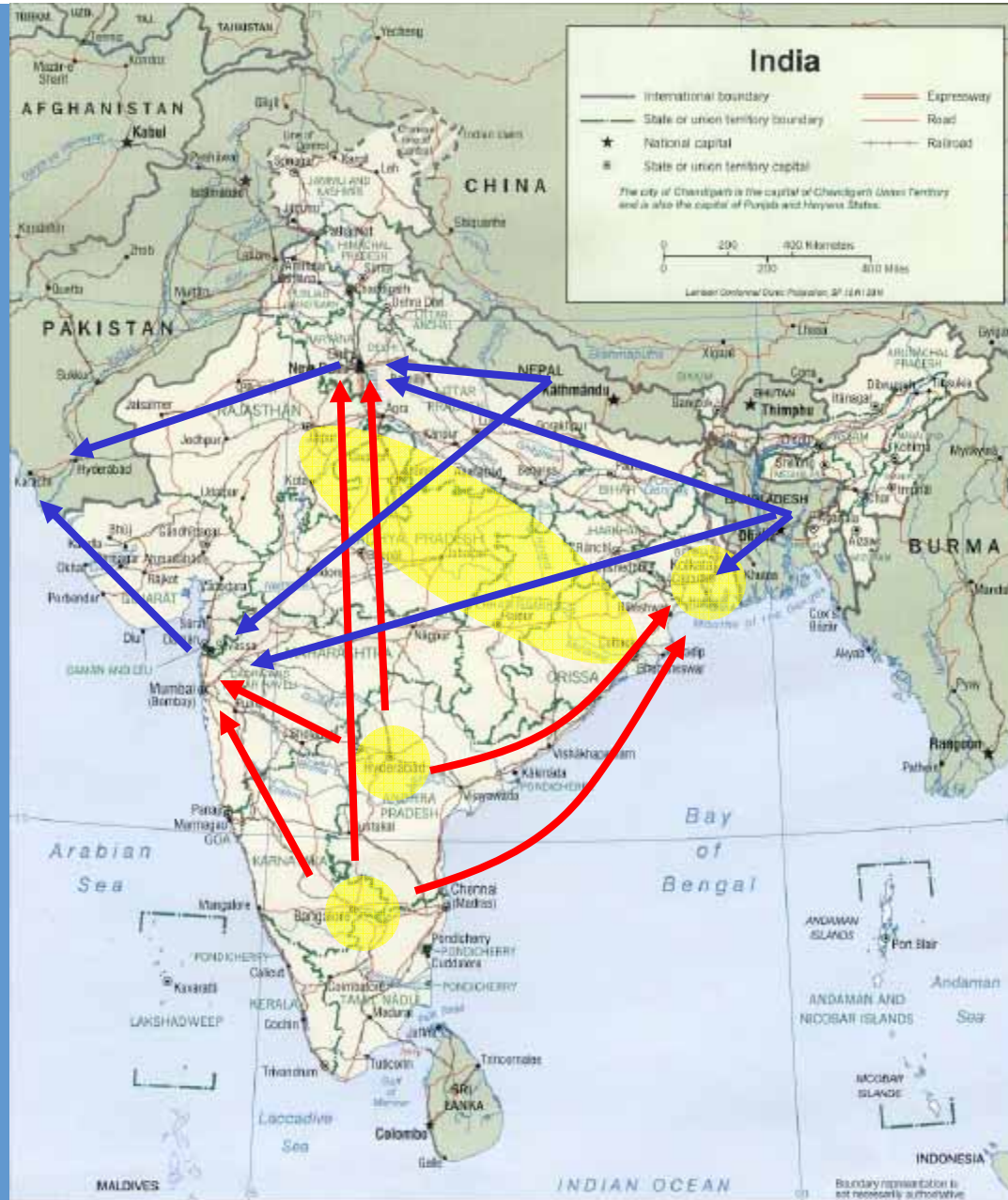
## Global Patterns – Transnational and Internal Trafficking

- Victims are reported to be trafficked from poor territories to more affluent areas.
- Both origin and destination countries have strong presence of organized crime.
- Victims are trafficked from rural areas to more affluent urban areas
- Exploited in the urban areas
- Further trafficked from urban areas abroad
