Roseanne L. Flores is an Associate Professor in the Department of Psychology at Hunter College of the City University of New York. She is also a Faculty Associate of the Roosevelt House Public Policy Institute at Hunter College as well as a member of the Human Rights faculty. She is a Developmental Psychologist by training and was a National Head Start Fellow in the Office of Head Start in Washington DC in 2009-2010. In 2013 she participated in the National Institute of Minority Health and Health Disparities Transnational Health Disparities course which has provided her with a foundation for much of her current research and scholarship which focuses on environmental risk factors such as community violence, poverty, and nutrition and their relationship to health and educational outcomes of minority children and families,

Bashi Treitler's scholarship theorizes about the dynamics of hierarchical socioeconomic structures, like the world system, or global and local racial structures. She has also earned distinctions for expertise in qualitative research methods.
