WIDEST-EVER GEOGRAPHICAL REACH FOR IDLO'S TECHNOLOGY LICENSING COURSE



Rome, July 5, 2013 – The International Development Law Organization celebrated the graduation of 24 participants from a record 20 countries who enrolled in the training course "The Dos and Don'ts of Technology Licensing for Developing Countries". The course, which is now in its fourth edition, taught participants how to negotiate technology transfer agreements and protect intellectual property rights, which are instrumental in fostering a legal environment that encourages investment and trade. It was graciously financed by Microsoft and accredited by Case Western Reserve University of Cleveland, Ohio.



Main challenges

Rule of Law helps

- Effective and well-functioning laws and institutions
- Enforcing public policies, protecting property rights, and ensuring fair and expeditious dispute resolution
- Predictable, fair laws and regulations, based on solid principles of justice equality and non-discrimination

Building a culture of justice

- Legal and judicial reforms necessary but insufficient measures
- A 'culture of justice' is needed to support innovative solutions to development challenges



Building a culture of justice



How

- Societies underpinned by principles of justice, equality and non-discrimination
- Citizens empowered and aware of their rights
- Vulnerable groups protected and able to realize equal rights
- Access to justice available when wronged



Concluding thoughts

- Ensure that the "rapid shift to ...drive sustainable and inclusive growth" is based on fair laws and regulations and solid principles of justice
