YEN highlighted in International Youth Day celebrations, August 12, 2003

The theme of this year's celebrations was **youth employment**. A major focus of the Day was on practical action to encourage the empowerment and participation of youth in the processes and decisions that affect their lives and give a clear message that unemployment is the problem, and youth are the solution.

In previous years the Day has focused on Sustainable Development (2002), and on HIV/AIDS (2001).

As well as the UN Secretary General delivering his [traditional message](#), the [YEN](#)

[Core Partners](#) and a number UN county offices used the Day to raise awareness about the challenge of youth employment and in particular highlight the work of the YEN:

The UN distributed the Secretary-General's statement to the press and to its field offices around the world as well as hosting a [web site](#) on the Day that suggested ways in which people could celebrate and offering a list of resources and useful links.

The World Bank used the occasion to highlight its role in the YEN as well its own activities on the issue of youth employment through a [major article](#) released by its media centre.

The ILO, as the Secretariat for the YEN, produced an [electronic information pack](#) in advance of the Day. This pack contains introductory information on the YEN, basic press materials and some of core documents relating to political activities of the YEN.

This pack enabled UN, World Bank and ILO regional and field offices to respond to or support any interest from the press or the public on the Day. This information is also providing offices with background to ongoing work of YEN allowing them to respond appropriately to requests for support from countries in the development of [National Action Plans on Youth Employment](#).

Country level activities on International Youth Day.

Indonesia

Indonesia chose International Youth Day 2003 to launch the [Indonesia Youth Employment Network. \(I-YEN\)](#)

I-YEN was officially launched in during ceremony in Jakarta by the Coordinating Ministry for Economic Affairs before an audience which included members of the I-YEN, representatives of UNDP, World Bank and ILO, members of the Indonesian Youth Parliament, representatives from business, trade unions, community and youth organizations, and students from local high

Vietnam

International Youth Day activities in Vietnam included:

- An [article on Youth Employment](#) that the ILO Office in Hanoi published in the Vietnam Investment Review.
- A media campaign on youth employment being implemented by Vietnam TV (VTV) with support from ILO Hanoi. Including a live dialogue broadcast at prime time on the Day. Panellists included the Director of the ILO Hanoi office, the head of Viet Nam's Youth Committee and the Director of Ministry of Labour's Vocational Training Department.
- A [joint UN agency press release](#) drafted by the UN Country Team working group on youth.

Tanzania

The Tanzania Youth Vision Association (TYVA) and Youth of United Nations Association (YUNA) organized an event on the Day, with ILO support. Activities running throughout the day included a youth rally (see photo below) and public dialogue on the challenges and opportunities that



globalization presents for youth employment.

At a public event attended by representatives from the Tanzanian government, the social partners, civil society and youth groups, UN specialised agencies and about 200 young

people, the Director of the ILO Dar-es-Salaam office delivered the Secretary-General's statement in his capacity as acting UN Resident Coordinator. The guest of honour, Hon. Prof. Kapuya, Minister for Labour and Youth Development made a key-note speech with other intervention being made by the ILO, representatives of youth groups and the social partners.

2nd Meeting of The Secretary-General's High Level Panel, June 30 – July 1, 2003

Building on the political success of the [UN General Assembly Resolution 57/165](#) on Promoting Youth Employment the objective of this meeting was to outline and agree on the [Next 5 Steps](#) in the implementation of the Youth Employment Network's strategy. The first session, in the afternoon of June 30, *Building on Achievements*, gave the Panel and other participants the opportunity to be updated on activities carried out over the past two years, and included progress reports on the political process since July 2001, catalysed by the Recommendations of the High Level Panel, youth organisations' activities to promote youth employment and on successful government policies for youth employment and new initiatives by pilot countries.

After an [introduction](#) by the **ILO Director General Juan Somavia**, the **Secretary-General** attended for one hour of this session during which time he heard a progress report of the work of his Network, which included interventions from High Level Panellists, government delegations and youth organisations. The Secretary General then responded and challenged the YEN "to move from the

excellent policy work that has been done to a new phase of action at the country level"

The second session, in the morning of July 1, *Mapping an Action Plan*, focused on the strategy for the Secretary-General's Youth Employment Network, and on the role of the High Level Panel. This session discussed the [consolidated report](#) of the High Level Panels [Working Groups](#), and highlighted how these recommendations will be translated into the implementation of National Action Plans on youth employment.

Dr. Mamphela Ramphele, World Bank Managing Director attended this session,

supporting the YEN's shift from a policy-based phase to a more action-orientated phase.



During a luncheon on July 1, **Ms. Eveline Herfkens, the Director of the Millennium Development**

[Campaign](#), presented her views on the momentum needed to successfully implement the Millennium Development Goals, and on the role of youth employment in those goals.

The third session, *Actors and their Roles*, in the afternoon of July 1, was devoted to a discussion on the future role of the Network's different actors, including the High Level Panel, in the implementation of the next five steps and on the communications strategy required to give the HLP/YEN more visibility and impact.

Finally there was a session on the conclusions of the meeting and an agreement on next steps.
