He is Director of the Townsend Centre for International Poverty Research and Head of the Centre for the study of Poverty and Social Justice. Mr. Land is the John Franklin Crowell Professor of Sociology at Duke University, where he is also the Director of the Center for Demographic Studies and Senior Fellow in the Center for the Study of Aging and Human Development. He has worked extensively on developing Indicators of Social Change and on Social Indicator Models within the United States, providing guidelines for the construction and analysis of indicators. He is well known for his scholarship and research in the development and application of mathematical and statistical models in sociology, demography, criminology, and social indicators/quality-of-life studies. He has authored over 100 books, journal articles, and other research publications on these topics. In the field of social indicators and quality-of-life studies, he has developed models for the construction, analysis, and forecasting of social indicators and the quality of life. Most recently, he has led a project sponsored by the Foundation for Child Development on the development and analysis of composite indexes for measuring trends in child and youth well-being in the United States from 1975 to the present. Mr. Land has been elected a Fellow of five professional associations: the American Statistical Association, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the Sociological Research Association, the International Society for Quality-of-Life Studies, and the American Society of Criminology. In 1997, he received the Paul F. Lazarsfeld Award for distinguished contributions to the field of sociological methodology from the Methodology Section of the American Sociological Association.
