Why green public procurement?

- Reduce the environmental impact of public consumption
- Consistency between requirements to others and own actions
- Promoting a marked for greener products
 - Important part of Integrated Product Policy and Sustainable Consumption and Production

History and legal basis

1992: New Environmental Protection Act:

Public authorities must.... in connection with procurement... endeavour to promote the objectives of this act.

1994: Action Plan for a Green Public Procurement Policy

1995: Circular to State institutions

1998: Voluntary agreement with the counties' and the municipalities' organisations

Activities

- Handbook/Manual
- Leaflets
- Product specific guidelines
- Guidelines on eco-labels, EMS and the EU procurement directives
- Seminars and conferences
- Education and training
- Subsidies for networks of purchasers

Product specific guidelines

- 47 different product groups
- Main env. aspects in whole life cycle
- Checklist: Suggested questions
- "The easy way":
 - Eco-labels (EU flower, Nordic Swan, energy labels, others)
 - EMAS/ISO 14001
 - Other
- Coming: internet tool

Status

Green procurement policies:

	1997/98	2000
Municipalities	15 %	31 %
Counties	42 %	69 %
Gov. inst.	90/30 %	52 %

"Green" requirements: Goods: often Services: sometimes

Status

Small survey among suppliers to National Procurement Limited (2001)

always/often sometimes

- Env. questions 39 % 17 %
- Env. decision 20 % 23 %
- 50 %: env. requirements from public sector has influenced product development
- 80 % expect more env. requirements
