### WORLD SUMMIT ON SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

6th plenary meeting

*Partnership Plenary* [8]

*Water and Sanitation*

The ex-officio Vice-President of the Summit, H.E. Dr. Nkosazana Clarice Dlamini Zuma, Minister of Foreign Affairs of South Africa, opened the Partnership Plenary.

Mrs. Margaret Catley-Carlson, Chairperson of the Global Water Partnership and Mr. Gourisankar Gosh, Water Supply and Sanitation Collaborative Council, acting as presenters, made statements.

Mr. Jan Pronk, Special Envoy of the Secretary-General on the World Summit on Sustainable Development, acting as moderator, addressed questions to a panel composed of: major groups – youth, women, trade unions, scientific and technological communities, non-governmental organizations, local authorities, indigenous people, farmers, business; Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations, World Health Organization, United Nations Development Programme, HABITAT, United Nations Children's Fund, United Nations Environment Programme and the Department of Economic and Social Affairs of the United Nations, the Chairman of the Water Supply and Sanitation Collaborative Council; UN Commission on Human Rights Special Rapporteur on the right to adequate housing, to which the panellists responded.

The following representatives then entered into an interactive dialogue: Switzerland, Mauritania, Yemen, India, United States of America, Uruguay, Ukraine, Eritrea, Belgium, Egypt, Pakistan, Kenya, Israel, Denmark (on behalf of the European Union), Madagascar, Canada, Niger, Venezuela, South Africa, Greece and Burkina Faso.

The observer for Palestine participated in the dialogue.

The Special Rapporteur of the Commission on Human Rights on the right to adequate housing participated in the dialogue.

A representative of the International Union for Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources, a non-governmental organization, participated in the dialogue.

The Secretary-General of the Convention of Wetlands also participated in the dialogue.

The two presenters made some concluding remarks.
