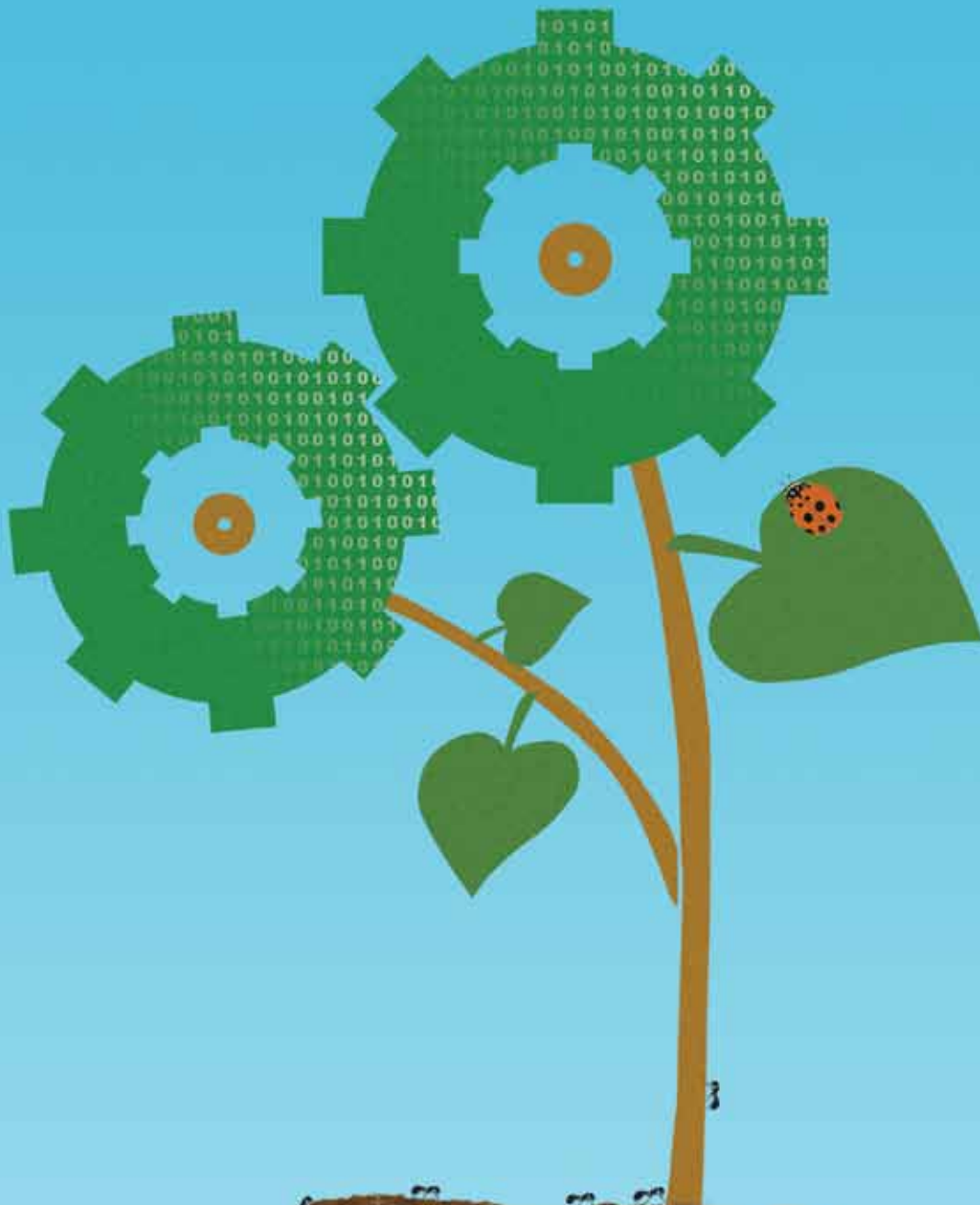

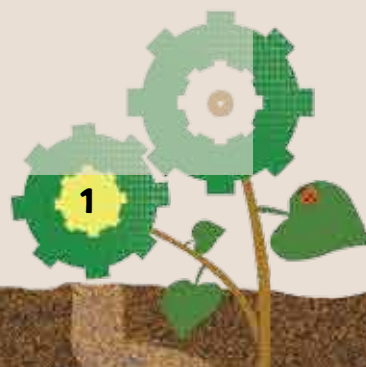

MESSAGE TO THE 3rd GLOBAL MODEL UNITED NATIONS



I am pleased to greet all participants in the third Global Model UN Conference organized by the United Nations. Your interest in international affairs comes at a time when young people are playing a growing role in shaping our

world. The revolutions sweeping North Africa and the Middle East have been led largely by youth, who have made up for their lack of political power and military might with dedication, creativity and courage. The results have left a remarkable imprint.

These youth and others around the world are re-making the way we achieve social and political change. They are confounding dictators and authoritarians who stand in the way of progress. Regimes that depend on shows of force may be well-equipped to fight armies and rebels, but they are completely unprepared to battle Facebook and Twitter.

Around the world, rigid hierarchies are giving way to decentralized networks. Today, position

in society matters less than how much energy and principled action a person brings to a cause. This new paradigm offers expansive opportunities for young people to make their mark.

The noble principles enshrined in the United Nations Charter have long inspired people to overcome injustice, from the fight against racism to the struggle for women's equality, from the drive for fair treatment of persons with disabilities to the battle to end discrimination based on sexual orientation. What has changed recently is the speed of our connections, the distance our messages can travel, and the degree to which we can link likeminded peoples and movements to achieve shared goals.

Advancing human progress in harmony with nature, the theme of your meeting, demands just this sort of collective action. The ecosystems and resources you will inherit have been subjected to unprecedented stress and exploitation. Different countries and societies have made very different contributions to this state of affairs, but all should be able to agree that it is unsustainable – and that we need to find a more balanced and sustainable approach.

It may be difficult for some members of the older generation to imagine how we can fundamentally transform lifestyles and consumption patterns, or how we can create a more equitable world. But I am confident there are few such limits on your ability to envision a better tomorrow. I urge you to use this Model United Nations conference to start planning for it today. The skills and understanding you gain through this experience will serve you well in the future as you advance the goals of the United Nations and help build a better world for all.

WELCOME MESSAGE

It is my great pleasure to convey this message to all the delegates to the Global Model United Nations conference, taking place in Incheon, Republic of Korea, from 10 to 14 August 2011.

The topic of this conference, “Sustainable development: Advancing human progress in harmony with nature”, comes at a very opportune time. World leaders will goiather next June in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, for the United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development – better known as Rio+20. Marking the 20th anniversary of the Rio Earth Summit and the 10th anniversary of the World Summit on Sustainable Development in Johannesburg, Rio+20 aims to assess the progress made toward realizing sustainable development and to renew our political commitment to it.

While we have made significant gains in terms of poverty eradication and human development, many challenges remain. Environmental change, including climate change and biodiversity loss, inequalities within and across nations and widespread patterns of consumption and production draw heavily on natural resources and continue to render sustainable development elusive. At Rio+20, we must strengthen our collective will and commitment to achieving sustainable development in all its three pillars - economic, environmental and social. We must also come up with concrete ways to advance “green economy” and the “institutional framework for sustainable development”, the two main themes of the conference.

A green economy in the context of sustainable development and poverty eradication is a topic which I find very important. While there is no universally accepted definition, green economy can be seen as a pathway to sustainable development that decouples economic growth from the excessive use of fossil fuels and natural resources, while creating job opportunities and providing a social safety net for the most vulnerable. On 2 June 2011, I convened a thematic debate of the General Assembly on green economy and helped to promote a broader understanding of green economy.

The other theme of Rio+20- the institutional framework for sustainable development- is equally important to ensure that we have a governance system with effective and representative institutions to support our efforts toward the balanced achievement of sustainable development at local, national, regional and global levels.

I hope that during the Global Model United Nations conference, delegates will explore in-depth creative ways to achieve sustainable development and to live in harmony with nature. It seems to me that with rapid industrialization, urbanization and emphasis on material wellbeing around the world, the humanity has lost touch with nature and forgotten to live in harmony with other living beings. It is imperative that we reconnect with the Earth and promote a new model of development that is less carbon-intensive and more conscious of its impact on nature. This has been one of the driving ideas behind the adoption of the resolution on harmony with nature by the General Assembly.

Young leaders like you, the delegates to the Global Model United Nations, carry the future of this planet on their shoulders. It is critical that the new generation of leaders commits to find solutions, and enact bold changes to bring the world closer to sustainability. I encourage you all to take the lead in “becoming the change you want to see” and in driving the world towards sustainable development.

I wish you fruitful exchanges.

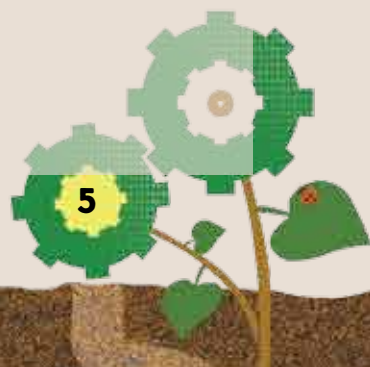
ny with nature.”

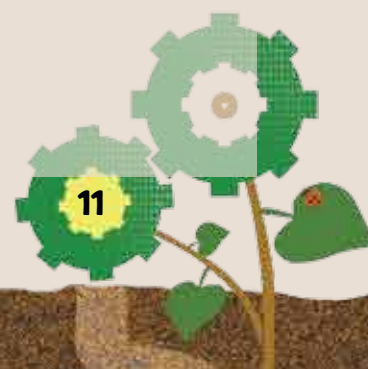

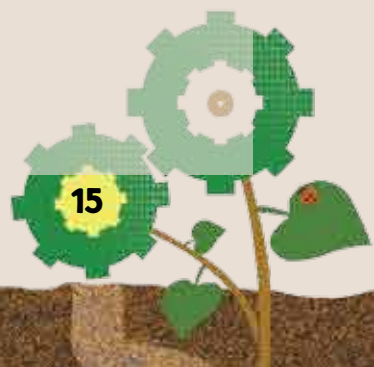

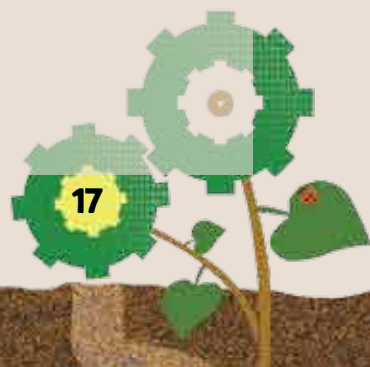

CODE OF CONDUCT

- All Global Model United Nations delegates are expected to comply with the Code of Conduct to ensure a civil and respectful work environment throughout the conference similar to that of the diplomatic corps at the United Nations. Delegates who do not follow the Code of Conduct will forfeit their privileges to debate and vote. In serious disciplinary cases, delegates may be asked to leave the conference.
- Global Model United Nations delegates must treat other delegates, members of the Secretariat and UN staff with the highest level of courtesy and respect. Please notify any member of the Secretariat if a dispute arises at any time during the Conference.
- Diversity is a core value of the United Nations. Discrimination based on gender, colour, nationality, age, religion or disabilities is prohibited in the activities of the Global Model United Nations conference. Please notify the Conference Secretariat if you believe any of these are being violated.
- The delegates must be professional in their speech, actions and appearance during the conference and display respect for the opinions and ideas of fellow delegates.
- Delegates must respect the property of the Songdo ConvensiA. Delegates will be financially responsible for any damage to this facility that may result from their actions.
- Global Model United Nations delegates are required to wear identification badges at all times to obtain access to all conference meetings and activities within the Songdo ConvensiA. Lost badges must be immediately reported to the Conference Secretariat and cannot be replaced.
- During the Global Model United Nations 2011, delegates must dress in formal attire, traditional national dress or western business attire (suit and tie for males and pant suit or knee length skirt for females). Jeans and hats are not allowed.
- Delegates must study the Rules of Procedure in depth and follow its clauses throughout the Conference. Please contact the Conference Secretariat should any questions about the Rules of Procedure arise.
- Global Model United Nations meetings will begin on time as scheduled. All delegates must arrive at their assigned conference rooms at least 10 minutes prior to the start of their meetings. The presence of all delegates at all committee meetings is essential for ensuring productive debate during the Conference and a successful outcome.
- Delegates must be present during all official Global Model United Nations working meetings. Delegates should schedule their leisure activities in the city of Incheon during their free time.
- During plenary and committee meetings, delegates are expected, at all times, to remain in character and represent the interests and policies of the countries to which they are assigned.
- During plenary and committee meetings, delegates will only be permitted to bring water into the conference room. Eating, smoking, or drinking other beverages during formal meetings is prohibited.

- Delegates are expected to give their full attention to the proceedings in all meetings. Passing notes during meetings could be distracting and is discouraged. Delegates should engage other delegations in discussions during breaks, informal consultations or after sessions have concluded for the day.
- The use of cell phones and other electronic devices will not be permitted during Global Model United Nations plenary and committee meetings. Laptops may only be used during informal consultations and when drafting resolutions.
- The UN Department of Public Information, in consultation with the Global Model United Nations Secretary General, will make all final decisions regarding disciplinary actions.

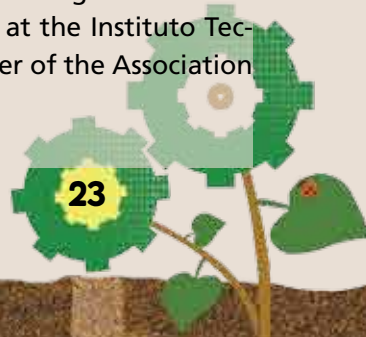


Carmen Alejandra Zavala Bandala (Vice-Chairperson, Second Committee)
