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NARRATION

RURAL SCENE (13") Nicaragua has been hit by poor economic conditions

and persistent drought. Taken together, they've led to widespread rural poverty in this Central American

country.

DOÑA GARCIA GROOMING On weekdays, Doña Garcia gets her children ready

for school. But with her husband away looking for work and seven kids to feed, her life is a struggle.

DOÑA GARCIA ON-CAMERA

"I'm a single mother and have no one to help me."

NARRATION

MEN LOADING SACKS ONTO HORSES (21") While the children prepare for their classes, sacks of donated food are delivered to the school's kitchen. Families here are subsistence farmers. But, years of uncertain rainfall has meant crops have failed and remaining food supplies do not provide an adequate diet for those most vulnerable: women and children.

DOÑA GARCIA SERVING FOOD

(25") cooks a nutrit

Doña, along with other mothers from the village, cooks a nutritious meal from food partly provided by the U.N. World Food Programme (WFP). As in many

countries where children are at risk of malnutrition, Nicaragua's school children receive nutrition supplements so they can not only grow physically, but also develop intellectually.

"It is absolutely critical that people have access to nutrition from the earliest stage of life."

NARRATION

Eighteen-month-old Dilcia was taken to the Child Nutritional Recovery Centre in nearby Matagalpa. She suffers from a serious respiratory infection, as well as diarrhoea and tuberculosis brought on by her weakened condition. Here, children ranging in age from one month to eleven years are helped to recover. Thanks to medical care and food supplements, Dilcia is making good progress, says Centre Director, Adriana Bracamonte...

BRACAMONTE:

ADRIANA BRACAMONTE ON-CAMERA (18.5") "Her improvement is remarkable. She has become more lively. When she first arrived, she was very depressed. Now she is very well."

SABRINA QUESADA ON-CAMERA (11") "With these projects they obtain bigger harvests from traditional plants in their gardens. This improves their food."
