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Concept Note

On 31 April this year, an article in Kyodo news revealed that a very dangerous incident occurred at the height of the Cuban Missile Crisis, the morning of 28 October 1962, on the Island of Okinawa. Specifically:

- An authentic order to launch all missiles was sent out by the commanding officer, a Major, to eight crews each responsible for four Mace B cruise missiles with 1.1 megaton warheads.
- The crews, two at each of four sites, began preparations to launch despite the misgivings of some of the launch officers about the order.
- At the advice of the senior field officer, a Captain, the countdown was suspended at one minute until launch. A request to retransmit the order was made, but the order was retransmitted unaltered.
- Only when directly challenged by the senior field officer did the Major issue a stand-down order.

The author of the article, Masakatsu Ota, was able to cite two crew members regarding these aspects of the incident. Airman John Bordne was one of these men. He has a good deal more to say about the incident, because unlike the other crew members, he was in the launch Control Center with the senior field officer and was able to hear what he was saying to the other launch offices.

Over 50 years after this incident, Mr. John Bordne received a clearance from the Air Force to publish his memoirs which includes a chapter on the Cuban Missile Crisis.

The producer of "The Man who Saved the World" has recorded a video interview with John Bordne which will be screened for the first time at the side event. Mr. Bordne will be answering questions from the audience via video conference.
