| INTRO OF LUPITA AND ADRIAN           | NARRATION:<br>Lupita, as she's known, and her 14 year old<br>boyfriend, Adrian, are expecting their first<br>child. (5.73")  |
| ADRIAN HOLDING LUPITA'S<br>BELLY     | ADRIAN GENARO DECENSIO: (In<br>Spanish)<br>"It's not moving now because it might be<br>asleep but suddenly it will move!" (4.33")  |
| LUPITA AND ADRIAN SITTING<br>IN PARK | NARRATION:<br>Lupita has been living on the streets since<br>she was nine years old. Like Marisol, she<br>was abused by her father. (6.23")  |

<u>LUPITA</u>: (In Spanish) "He beat me and made me do all the housework." (1.94")

NARRATION: Even her step-mother could not protect her. (2.02")

B & W B-ROLL OF STREET PAVEMENT AND POLICE CARS ON STREET <u>LUPITA</u>: (In Spanish) "She couldn't stop him because she wasn't my own family – so she let him beat me." (3.87")

### NARRATION:

And so Lupita fled, planning to live on the streets on her own. But she was soon taken by the police to a shelter, one of several in Mexico City offering street kids a safe haven. (12.09")

LUPITA: (In Spanish)

LUPITA AND EDNA ON CAMERA "I escaped. It wasn't that I didn't like it, I felt more restricted in the shelter than in the street." (6.43")

### NARRATION

LUPITA AND ADRIAN WALKING Like many kids, she has spent the last years in and out of shelters. And, in the summer of 2010, Lupita and Adrian met at one of them. (10.51")

LUPITA AND ADRIAN WALKING UP LADDER The next day, they receive a visit from Edna, the outreach worker. For 12 years, she's been working with street-kids, winning their trust and, ultimately, trying to get them to move into a shelter permanently. (13.67")
