HOSPITALS WITH DOCTORS TREATING CHILDREN Every 20-seconds, experts say, somewhere in the world a child dies of a water-related disease. Most common among them, cholera, typhoid, and diarrhoea, which is the second leading cause of death among children under five years old. (16.14")

Compounding the problem is lack of KANYESIGYE ON-CAMERA AT SPINGS Kampala's population has more than doubled, and overcrowded informal settlements have sprung up along Lake Victoria. (14.01")

NIGHT SHOTS OF EMPTYING LATRINE

CHILDREN PLAYING IN THE LATRINE AREA WANDERA ON-CAMERA Late at night, Helen's neighbour tends to an overflowing pit latrine a few steps from his home. His only option is to empty its contents directly into the streets. By the next day, children eat and play in the very spot where the latrine was emptied ... (21.29")

<u>ABU BAKER WANDERA</u>: (In English) "It's the reality. We need to take action. We need to do something. The community is doing that out of frustration. Out of their lack of options. (9.14")
