The ability to respond quickly and efficiently to emergencies is at the core of UNHCR's work, a priority supported by the European Commission's humanitarian arm, ECHO. (10)

MICHEL ARRION, EUROPEAN COMMISSION, HEAD OF UNIT DG HUMANITARIAN AID ON-CAMERA "We have heard too many times that the donors, and the UN, and the international community was slow responding to the needs of the population and we want to improve that." (11)

SOPHIE IN AIRCRAFT

<u>NARRATION</u>

Only a few weeks later, Sophie is on her way to her first real emergency. She and other UNHCR staff are rushed to help thousands of Togolese refugees fleeing the violence that flared up in the aftermath of contested presidential elections. (15)

SOPHIE WALKING THROUGH COME CAMP

Sophie is in charge of Come camp, with a capacity of some 1,400 people and already full. The logistics of running a camp for so many people are enormous – from shelter and water to security and food, the work goes on late into the night. (15)

SOPHIE ADDRESSING REFUGEES Training can never prepare for all situations, such as coping with the anger of refugees for whom no place can be found in the camp. (7)

But despite all the hard work and difficult moments, Sophie has no regrets. (4)

"This is an amazing experience, being in an emergency is so rewarding -- it's extremely rewarding. There are all the smiles, there are all the children running around mentioning my name and trying to tell me whatever - it's unbelievably nice, no – I love it." (17)
