MILLENNIUM VILAGE IN MALAWI

NARRATION

MARIA ISSA IN FRONT OF HUT 39-year-old divorced mother of three, Maria Issa,

is one of the poorest farmers in Mwandama village in southern Malawi in Southern Africa.

She never had enough food for her family. (12")

ISSA: (In local language)

ISSA ON-CAMERA "When food is scarce, I have one meal a day.

The children and I go to bed hungry." (5")

MARIA HARVESTING But the days of hunger for Maria and her children

are now over. This year, she harvested a

bumper crop of maize. Something that rarely

happened in the past. (11")

FARMERS AND FIELDS Land-locked Malawi is one of the poorest

countries in the world. More than 65% of its 13 million people survive on less than half a dollar a day. Most of them are subsistence farmers. (13")

In July 2005, the United Nations Millennium

Project along with the United Nations

development Programme, UNDP, the Earth
Institute at Columbia University and the
Government of Malawi initiated the Millennium
Village in Mwandama to demonstrate what it will
take to meet the Millennium Development Goals
within five years. Professor Jeffrey Sachs is a
Special Adviser to the United Nations Secretary –
General for the Millennium Development Goals.

PROFESSOR SACHS ON-CAMERA "We started very fast with you because we know how much hunger is and how much need there is to grow more food." (8")

NARRATION

FARMERS RECEIVING SEEDS

The project provided each of the 1,069 families in the village with 10 kegs of hybrid maize seeds and 100 kegs of basal and top dressing fertiliser. It's enough to farm almost one hectare of land. Farmers also received training skills to improve productivity. (17")

CHIEF AND FARMERS
INSPECTING FIELD

With lots of rain this season, the result is incredible. Each farmer is expected to harvest more than 60 bushels of maize, enough to feed their families and to sell a good surplus for much needed cash. (13")

Chief Mwandama is happy with the intervention.(2")

"This year it is like a miracle because every household has plenty of food. No more

starvation" (6")

TWO DIFFERENT FIELDS

While other regions of Malawi suffer from drought

and poor harvest, the success of the

interventions in Zomba region can contribute to

the reduction of hunger in other parts of the

country. (12")

MARIA COOKING

But for Maria's youngest child, the harvest came

a little too late. The baby died of malaria and

hunger just a few weeks before food became

available once again. (12")

FARMERS SINGING

In 2006, the Millennium Villages will be scaled up

throughout the continent with the hopes of

working in hundreds more in the coming years.

Increasing support from the international

community can make a big difference and can

mean either life or death for millions of farmers in

Africa. (20")
