# NARRATION

WOMAN AND CHILDREN	Mother of five children, 45-year old Meja Abdallah lives with her family in the village of Michamvi on the island of Zanzibar off the eastern coast of Africa. (10")
MEJA WALKING TO WELL	Despite living in one of the most scenic areas in the world, Meja's family is facing a serious dilemma. There is no running water in the village and the local wells are salty. (12")
MEJA ON-CAMERA	<u>MEJA</u> : (In local dialect) "We have a problem with water. Cooking and drinking water are salty." (5")
AERIAL VIEW OF ZANZIBAR	NARRATION The water situation in Zanzibar has recently deteriorated both in quantity and quality. Most of the one million inhabitants of the island have no running water. (10")

OLD PUMPS	rapid urban growth and the influx of tens of thousands of tourists every month place significant strain on an already aged and poorly maintained water supply system. (18")
PRINCIPAL SECRETARY	Yasser De Costa is the principal Secretary of the Ministry of Water. (3")
DE COSTA ON-CAMERA	<u>DE COSTA</u> : (In English) "We have very old and outdated machines, more than 40-50 years old". (9")
WATER TANKERS/DONKEY CART AND WATER DRUMS	NARRATION There is no charge for running water services in Zanzibar. But not every one on the island receives this service. People in the poor neighbourhoods walk long distances to get water or buy it from water vendors - adding a financial burden on an already impoverished population. (16")
COMMUNITY/ WATER RESERVOIR/ WOMEN GETTING WATER	To alleviate the water shortage, communities are encouraged to form cooperatives to get piped water. Here in Muungano, the United Nations Development Programme, UNDP, helped in establishing the SEMUSO cooperative. Now three neighbourhoods have piped water. (17")
