## **NARRATION**

Sandra is no stranger to the United Nations -- she's already witnessed the drafting of the first human rights treaty of this century: the International Convention for the Rights and Dignity of People with Disabilities. A process instigated by the representatives of Mexico. (15,5")

The question now is how to use this document to enable the estimated 600 million persons with disabilities -- around the world -- to fully integrate in their societies. (10")
