the outskirts of Bucharest. He is an ethnic Roma.

Sorin often feels excluded. Stereotype and

convicted for dealing drugs. During their absence,

Sorin was raised by his grandmother, Maria

Tudor. All the adults in the family are unemployed

and to make ends meet, she works at a flower

BUCHAREST / POOR HOUSING Some Roma have managed to integrate into their

societies but many here in Romania live

marginalized lives due to pervasive widespread

poverty and low levels of schooling. Poverty rates

for them are more than twice the national average.

But education is rapidly becoming a force for

change. (18.5)

ADRIANA: (Romanian) **F**

ADRIANA ON CAMERA "If my father can support me I would like to go to

college." (3)

<u>NARRATION</u>

ADRIANA READS FOR CHILDREN, 10-year old Adriana knows exactly what she wants

WHILE MOTHER COOKS to be when she grows up. (4)

ADRIANA ON CAMERA <u>ADRIANA</u>: (Romanian) **F**

"I want to be a teacher." (2)

ADRIANA READS <u>NARRATION</u>

She is already practicing her teaching skills with her younger cousins. But they are not Adriana's only pupils. She is also teaching her mother to

read and write. (10)

VILLAGE WOMEN

The majority of Roma women above 45 are illiterate. This includes Adriana's mother, Maria. (5.5)

MARIA PITTIGOI, ADRIANA'S MOTHER, ON CAMERA MARIA PITTIGOI: (Romanian) **F**"It's like being blind. I do not know how to read, I am ignorant of many things. It feels like my eyes are permanently closed." (7.5)

ADRIANA TEACHES MARIA TO READ AND WRITE

NARRATION

But slowly Maria is opening her eyes to the world. She has received the gift of literacy and she is learning fast. (7)

ROMA MEDIATORS GO INTO HOMES, TALK TO LOCAL ROMA WOMEN Nobody knows for sure how many ethnic Roma there are in Romania. Estimates vary from 500 thousand to 2.5 million. Accurate population estimates are difficult because of infrequent data collection, their mobility, and reluctance to register as Roma in censuses for fear of being stigmatized. (20)

SORIN GETS READY TO GO TO SCHOOL AND WALKS OUT

On this day, Sorin gets ready for a classroom discussion on inter-ethnic relations. An articulate child, he's been thinking about his future and the kind of world he would like to see as an adult. (12.5)

SORIN: (Romanian) M

SORIN WALKS TO SCHOOL

"I would like to change the world when I grow up,

to make it better and more equal, with not so many poor people and a few rich ones. And for people not to judge others by their differences." (10)

NARRATION

SORIN'S CLASSROOM

SORIN ON CAMERA

CLASSROOM

At this UN supported school, seventy percent of the 400 pupils are ethnic Roma. According to the children there are no major problems between them here. (11)

SORIN: (Romanian) M

"There is no difference between us. There is really no reason why I shouldn't have friends who are not Roma." (6)

NARRATION

Here at Sorin's school and elsewhere there is hope that life for ethnic Roma will be better in the future. (6)

ADRIANA AND MOTHER GO TO ROMA CENTER

The future has arrived for Adriana and Maria. At this UN supported Roma Community Centre, mother and daughter are moving up to the next step. (8.5)

MOTHER AND DAUGHTER LEARN
TO USE COMPUTER

They are both learning how to use computers. The family is now saving money to acquire their own. Education has made mother and daughter even closer to one another. Both Adriana and Sorin know that they're lucky. (13)

BUCHAREST STREETS / BOY

WITH DOG

A large of number of Roma kids still remain outside the educational system. This child's family cannot afford to send him to school and he supplements his parent's meagre income begging in the streets of downtown Bucharest. He wishes he was elsewhere. (15)

ROMA BOY: (Romanian) M

ROMA BOY ON CAMERA "I would like to be in school but I don't have

books..." (3)

<u>NARRATION</u>

ROMA CHILDREN PLAY Romanian Constitution stipulates equality for all

its citizens regardless of ethnicity, but it will take

decades for attitudes to change and for living

standards to improve for all the Roma population

in Romania. (12)
