agriculture is the principal source of employment.

This leads in turn to a steady migration of rural

refugees from conflicts in the Middle east
contribute to overcrowding and to further migration

In Jordan's arid south...what little water there is

The IFAD-supported program encouraged farmers
to collect rainwater by building cisterns...and
check dams, which not only reduces the damage
caused by flash floods but spreads water over
larger areas that could be used to grow crops.

Istapeg Abdalgabear is one of 5,000 farmers now taking part in the program. Last year, she built a cistern to capture and store water during the rainy season. Water she'll use this summer to keep her olive trees alive. (14)

"Building the cistern really has made a difference and now the olive trees get enough water...I think it really has saved us." (7)

NARRATION

With a sustainable water supply and more than 100 olive trees, Istapeg believes she and her two children have a future here.// The kind of future that Tawfiq El Zabri of IFAD sees as a necessity. (13)

TAWFIQ EL ZABRI (ENGLISH) M

"If farmers are not supported and they find their only alternative is to move to the towns and cities, then all of Jordan will become a desert and that would make, of-course, also the water resources more vulnerable. It's not really an option for Jordan." (13)
