<u>NARRATION</u>

WOMAN FETCHES WATER FROM OUTDOOR FAUCET These women sell their water for a small price, 20 shillings a bucket. They mostly sell to other neighbourhood women, who used to have to get up early and walk to fetch water. These

taps also help improve health in a city often prone to cholera outbreaks. The water is clean because it comes from a bore, and it is cheaper than water sold by vendors, which can cost up to 500 shillings a bucket.

Since the water authority and the cooperative sank a bore three years ago, these women have made about 5 thousand US dollars. Sara Nyoni, who is part of cooperative, says they plan to drill more bores and put the money back into water. (16)
