For over two decades a bloody civil war was fought between Sudan's Muslim north against Christians and animists in the south, leaving 1.5 million people dead. Like so many young people in southern Sudan, Maal fought during the war. (16")

how the government of south Sudan manages to

RIVER / PORT The city is fairly close to Ethiopia, Uganda,

Kenya, The Democratic Republic of Congo and

the Central African Republic. The White Nile passes through here and many believe that trade with Sudan's neighbours will play a major role in Juba's future. It could well become a transport and commercial hub for this part of Africa. (24")
