NARRATION

YOUNG PEOPLE PLAY BOARD GAME	Life has not been fun and games for these orphans. They grew up in institutions with few resources. At 18, they were set out in the world with many challenges and no skills. But now, luck is smiling on them. (13.5")
ORPHANS IN HOUSE / DOING LAUNDRY AND COOKING	In this group house they renovated and run with help from a small World Bank grant, young men and women learn what it's like to live in a home. They are taught the things parents usually show their children: how to do laundry and to cook. They have a year to become adults with the help of den mother, guardian angel and therapist Rosalia. (19.5")
ROSALIA ON CAMERA	<u>ROSALIA CADAR</u> : (Romanian) F "They don't have a lot of common sense. It's hard for most people to imagine how much they lack." (5")

CRISTINA WORKS IN PACKING FACTORY	NARRATION Rosalia persuaded this company to hire Cristina. Although Romania has anti-discrimination laws, it can be hard for someone with disabilities to find work. And the orphans have to work: there are no state handouts for them. (13.5")
	She is one of the lucky ones helped through a small World Bank grant. Every year five thousand Romanian orphans turn 18 and, overnight, must fend for themselves. Many wind up on the streets. (11.5")
CRISTINA IN STREET / CRISTINA AND VIOLETA ENTER APARTMENT	Cristina has left the group house and moved in with Violeta – a friend since they were nine together in the orphanage. (7")
CRISTINA AND VIOLETA SHOW THEIR APARTMENT	<u>VIOLETA</u> : (English) F "Here is the kitchen, where I cook" (2")
	CRISTINA:(English)F"Here is my bed."(1.5")
	<u>NARRATION</u> Having a home and a job is exciting. (2.5")
CRISTINA ON CAMERA	CRISTINA:(Romanian)F"I work the end of the line. I also keep a log andhelp the machinist, and I stick labels."(4.6")
VIOLETA ON BED	NARRATION But their dreams are modest. (1.5")

GINO MOPS, DOES DISHES AND	Gino wants more than anything to have her own
CLEANS	place. After leaving the orphanage, she ended up
	on the streets, pregnant. Because orphans Gino's
GINO WALKS IN STREET	age did not receive much love or attention when
	they were small, a programme now exists to help
GINO KICKS BALL WITH SON	mothers like her bond with their children. So when
	her son Julian was born, the pair lived in a center
	that kept them together. But when Julian turned
	two, they were turned out and left to their own
	devices. (27")
	GINO GAL LENICI: (Romanian) F
GINO ON CAMERA	"When I don't have my own place, I feel like crying.
	I don't like my son being homeless." (5")
	NARRATION
GINO WITH SON	Gino had no choice: Julian is in an orphanage - the
	same one she was in at 13. Her son can't live in
	the group house, and she can't yet feed two
	mouths. Romanian orphanages have undergone
	radical reform since Gino's day, and her son is well
	cared for, but she wants to be with him. (18.3")
	GINO GAL LENICI: (Romanian) F
GINO ON CAMERA	"I want to raise him, wash his clothes, and cook for
	him, take him to kindergarten, to school, and I want
	him to learn English." (6.8")
