HADIJATOU MANI: (Local Dialect) F

HADIJATOU MANI ON CAMERA

"I worked the fields and cared for my master's first four wives. I cooked all the food, did all the laundry, took care of the animals. I was a slave

and my owner called me a slave." (11.5")

WOMEN

There are tens of thousands of female slaves in

Niger. They are called "fifth wives" because

they are bought after men already have four

wives, <u>legal</u> under Islamic tradition. Many men

can and do have more than one so-called "fifth

wife"...a practice that is illegal...but <u>not</u> uncommon in this country. (20")

CU. COOKING POT HADIJATOU MASHING GRAIN Hadijatou wasn't even a teenager when a family friend took her and sold her to a man known as the Charlatan. (7.5")

HADIJATOU WALKING TOWARDS CAMERA HADIJATOU MANI: (Local Dialect) **F**"I was the seventh one. My life was one of
misery, of beatings, of inhumane treatment. He
hit me with his hands and with shoes made of
leather." (10")

HADIJATOU ENTERS HUT

Hadijatou was also repeatedly raped and had two children. (4")

M/S HADIJATOU TALKING

What she didn't know was that in 2003, the Niger government passed an anti-slavery law. (6.5")

PRINCE ALMO ARRIVING ON MOTORCYCLE

Prince Almo, working for a local anti-slavery organization, came and confronted the Charlatan, insisting that he release Hadijatou. The Charlatan agreed, but never told her. She finally heard the news from her brother months

HADIJATOU ON CAMERA

HADIJATOU MANI: (Local Dialect) **F**"The only way I'd go back to the Charlatan was as a corpse." (4")

<u>NARRATION</u>

HADIJATOU NOW LIVING WITH HER NEW HUSBAND Liberated, she married a local farmer but the Charlatan went to the authorities to charge Hadijatou with bigamy. (7")

HADIJATOU WITH HER SON, PREPARES FOOD Although six months pregnant, a county court threw her in jail for two months. (5")

INT'L. HUMAN RIGHTS
WORKERS DISCUSSING
HADIJATOU'S CASE

Hadijatou's plight caught the attention of two international human rights organizations... (5") ... and in a bold legal move they approached the highest court in the West African region – charging that the government of Niger had failed to enact <u>its own</u> law forbidding slavery and had <u>not</u> protected Hadijatou. (13.5")

HIGH COURT HEARING
HADIJATOU'S SLAVERY CASE

The court heard the case in April 2008. Six months later, the judge read the verdict. (6")

INSIDE THE COURT HEARING

JUSTICE MALLE: (French) **F**

JUDGE READING THE VERDICT

"Hadijatou has been a victim of slavery and the Niger government is responsible for this." (8")

THE JUBILANT HADIJATOU AFTER THE VERDICT

Hadijatou won....and made history. This former slave – bought as a child – had waged a battle whose outcome could now affect <u>hundreds of thousands</u> of women across West Africa. (11.5")
