Supported by a charity group, Haiti Hospital Appeal and the UN Mission in Haiti, the goal is to integrate the disabled into society says CEO, Carwyll Hill. 24

With help from his trainer, Albert Marty, LEON WENT OUT OF THE CLINIC from the Swiss Foundation for Paraplegics, Leon is competing to qualify for the London 2012 Paralympics. His determination and efforts are giving hope to other patients at the centre.
