VIEWS OF TANZANIA, SCHOOL CHILDREN, PEOPLE WITH ALBINISM In Tanzania, people with albinism, like Mwigulu, are often killed and dismembered due to a widespread belief that charms made from their body parts bring good fortune and prosperity. (13)

MUSIC – ALBINO CHILDREN

The condition – inherited and present at birth - is characterized by reduced or lack of pigment in the skin, hair, and eyes. (9)

CHILDREN WALKING TO SCHOOL

Constantly faced with discrimination and extreme violence, they fight for their survival. (6)

ALBINO FAMILIES AND MARIAM

Supporting survivors of extreme violence or torture is critical, says Alicia Londono of the UN Human Rights Office. (8)

"They are growing up without any engagement any interaction, any linkages with their families, with their cultural set up. In complete absence of this, it is like these children are being considered individuals of institutionalisation as soon as they are born." (27)

CHILDREN IN DINING ROOM

The United Nations Human Rights Office has voiced concern about the segregation of children living at these centres. It's also alarmed over the continuing discrimination and shocking violence against this vulnerable group. (15)
