"Eat Offbeat delivers authentic ethnic meals that are conceived, prepared, and delivered by refugees who settled here in New York City. We hire passionate home cooks and train them to become professional chefs. We deliver their food in the way they cook at home to New Yorkers all over the city. We mostly deliver to groups of 10 people and more. We've done small dinners of 10 but we've also done large events of 700 or 800

people." (52)

ROSE: (In English) F

"My name is Rose. I am from Central African

Republic. I came here in 2007. I was a refugee in

another country, Cameroon. UNHCR (UN Refugee

Agency) got me in Cameroon and the American

Government chose me to come to the US. I like

working here because they are so nice, organized,

and clean. We work like a family. I am planning to

cook Cassava leaves with peanut butter. In my

country, we like sauce with peanuts a lot." (35)

BAHIA: (In English) M

BAHIA ON-CAMERA "My name is Bahia. I am from Algeria. I've been

here for five months. For me, food is a way of expression. It's the face of a culture of any

country. We can't let it apart from the whole

identity. I want them to think of us as people." (22)
