<u>CHOLERA OUTBREAK IN NORTHERN UGANDA ENDANGERS THOUSANDS OF</u> <u>WAR DISPLACED PEOPLE</u>

M/S OF ARMED MEN WALKING THROUGH GRASS FIELDS	Northern Ugandafor nearly two decades civil war has raged ondisplacing more than one and a half million peoplecrowding them into camps like this one. Otebe Wolu lives in oneand today he lies in a camp's treatment centerstricken with cholera. (17)
OTEBE IN HOSPITAL BED	<u>OTEBE</u> : (In Luo) "I'm not sure how I contracted it, but I have not been drinking boiled water." (7)
W/S VILLAGE	NARRATION Otebe is just one victim of a cholera outbreak that has infected nearly 700 people and killed more than 20. It causes acute diarrhea, vomiting and can quickly lead to severe dehydration and death. (13)
W/S PABBO CAMP	Hampering efforts to control the outbreak – poor sanitation and congestion in displaced persons camps scattered across northern

Uganda.....Pabbo, Uganda's largest camp is home to 64,000...and is now the center of the outbreak. (15)

 "It's overcrowded." (2)

<u>NARRATION</u> Cholera Coordinator Dr. Owen Justin... (3)

 JUSTIN:

 DR. JUSTIN ON CAMERA
 "I mean the camp is over-populated. It has about four times the recommended number of people to stay in the camp." (6)

<u>NARRATION</u> Huts...and contaminated latrines so close together make it easier for disease to spread. There's contaminated food, and little water for washing... and for drinking, causing many to drink dangerous unfiltered water. (13)

WOMAN EDUCATING THEUNICEF is educating the community aboutCOMMUNITYways to avoid cholera but its experts, like Dr.George Rae, warn more needs to be done. (8)

AERIAL VIEW OF PABBO CAMP <u>RAE:</u> "Hygiene education is not enough to stand the tide of this cholera because of the congestion in the camps." (7)

AERIAL VIEW OF OTONG CAMP	NARRATION And that's exactly what they're doingHere, at the Otong Camp, huts are built further apart and sanitary facilities have been put in place. Okidi Samuel and his family were moved here from Pabbo. (17)
OKIDI SAMUEL ON CAMERA	<u>SAMUEL</u> : "Have you seen the place, this is better. Even the place of putting latrines, is enough here." (7)
M/S OF WOMAN STANDING IN FRONT OF HUT	<u>NARRATION</u> There are no reported cases of cholera at Otong but it's only a start says Dr. Rae. (5.5)
DR. RAE ON CAMERA	<u>DR. RAE</u> : "But much more resources are needed to put in to normalize the situation." (4.5)
W/S OF OTONG CAMP	<u>NARRATION</u> Unless that happens, the experts warn, thousands here, especially children, remain at risk. (6)
