ABOUT US



The United Nations Global Counter-Terrorism Coordination Compact was launched by Secretary-General António Guterres in February 2018 to strengthen the coordination of UN counter-terrorism efforts and promote an 'all-of-UN' approach in counter-terrorism.

[The Counter-Terrorism Compact](#) is the largest coordination framework across the three pillars of work of the United Nations: peace and security; sustainable development; and human rights. It currently consists of 46 UN and non-UN entities.

It is the primary institutional vehicle for the coordination and coherence of UN counter-terrorism efforts, and provides support to Member States in their implementation of the [United Nations Global Counter-Terrorism Strategy](#).

The Under-Secretary-General for Counter-Terrorism, Mr. Vladimir Voronkov, chairs the Counter-Terrorism Compact Coordination Committee, which comprises the representatives of all Counter-Terrorism Compact entities, as well as the Chairs and Vice-Chairs of its eight Working Groups.

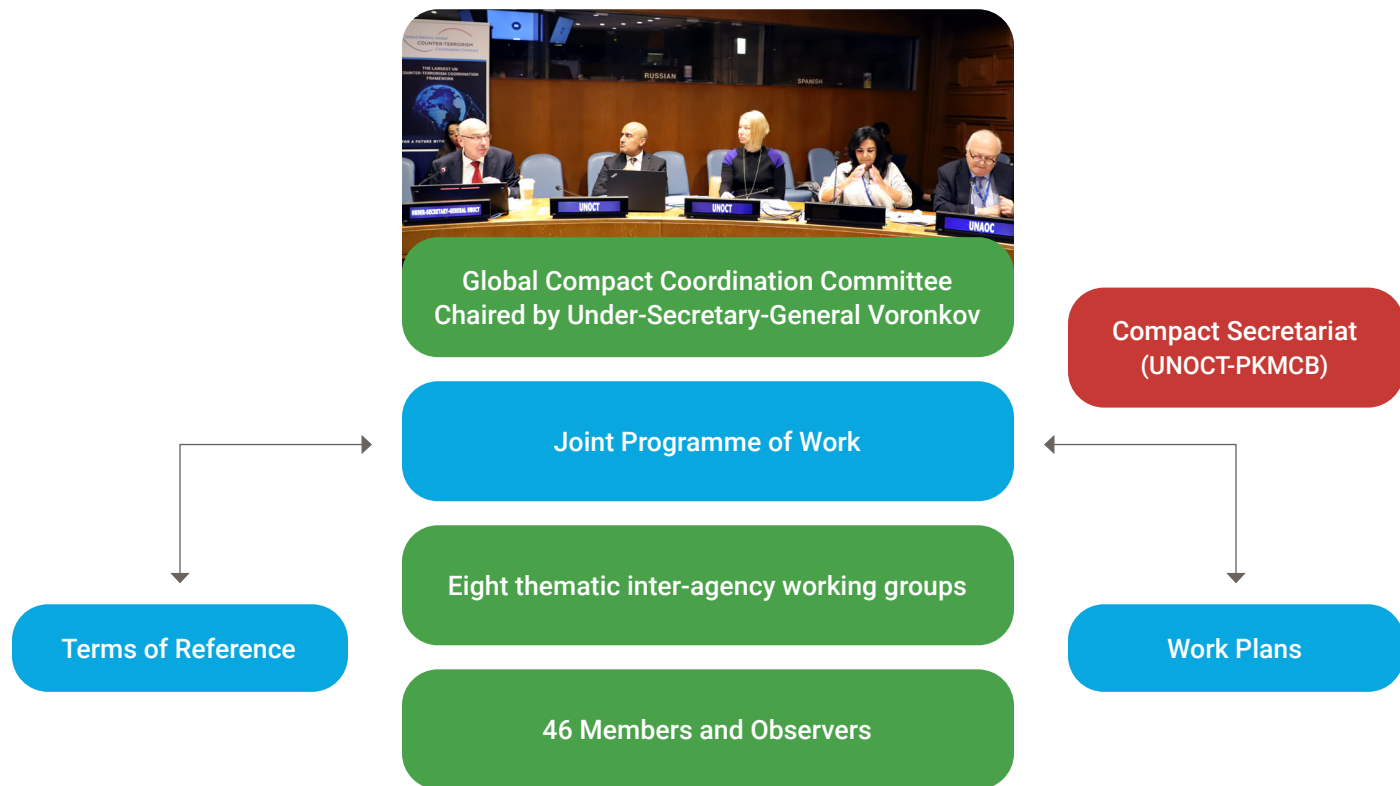

THE FINANCIAL ACTION TASK FORCE (FATF)

The FATF joined the Compact in April 2022. The FATF is an inter-governmental global money laundering and terrorist financing watchdog, which sets international standards to prevent these illegal activities. The FATF works to generate the political will for national legislative and regulatory reforms and brings together over 200 countries and jurisdictions committed to their implementation.

ENHANCING MORE SPECIFIC COORDINATION

- 14 Regional Organizations have nominated their focal points to the Platform
- At the Seventh Coordination Committee meeting held on 14 December 2021, the Compact entities unanimously endorsed the Options Paper that propose **7 practical steps for enhancing regional and field coordination** through the Counter-Terrorism Compact

1	Take into account country-specific recommendations from entities that have developed a strong knowledge and expertise in country situations
2	Include agenda items focused on addressing thematic issues in specific countries or regions
3	Invite field staff of entities to their meetings, including Resident Coordinators and UNOCT of countries affected by terrorism
4	Engage with civil society organizations, women-led organizations and networks, youth, academic institutions, and the private sector representatives
5	Strengthen their engagements with Member States and regional organizations, and invite them to brief during their sessions and/or meetings
6	Explore concrete options for collaboration with the GCTF working groups
7	Leverage the Compact Platform to increase the online collaboration between Compact entities and Member States' focal points, and to grant access of field representatives from Compact entities to working group's spaces

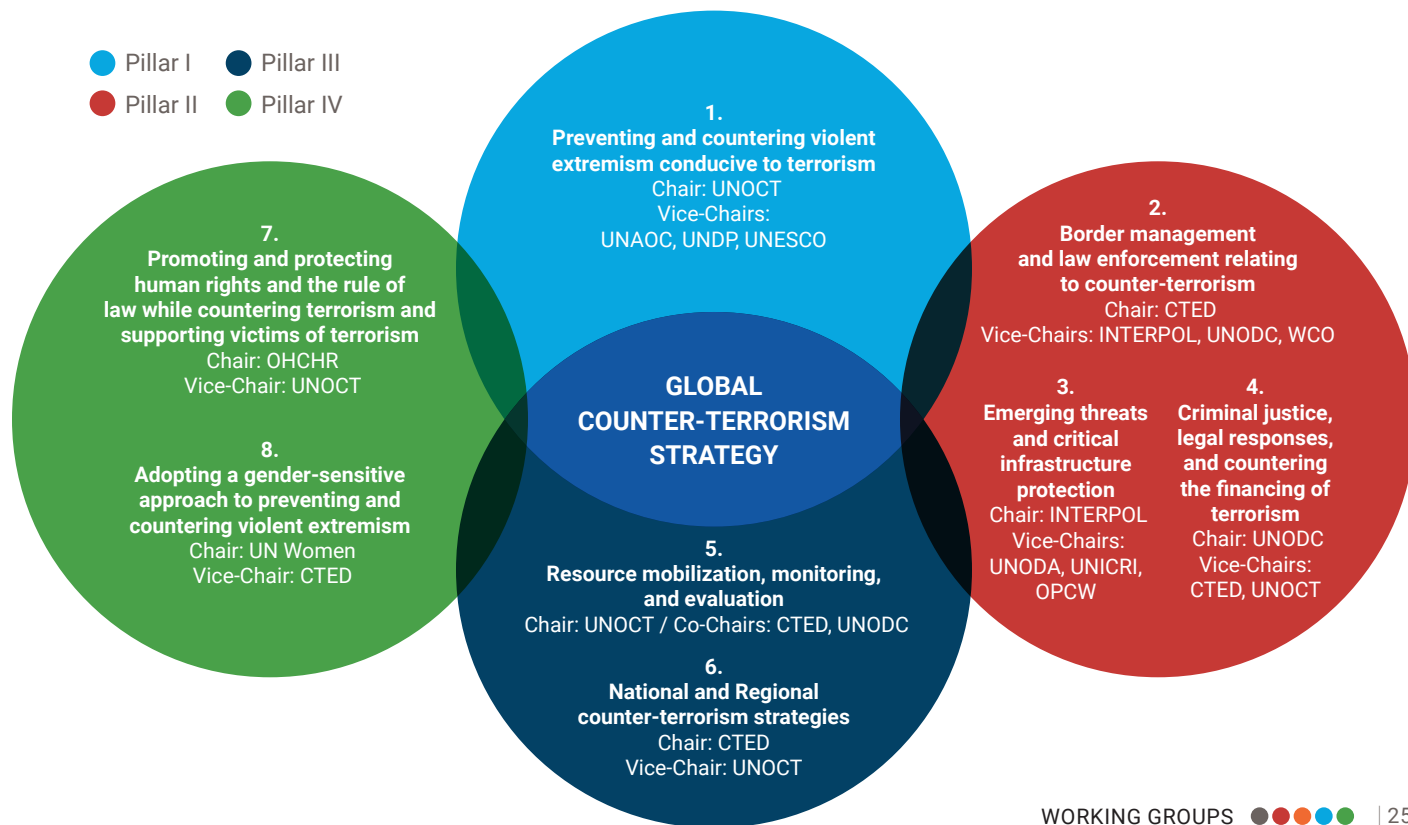

KEY HIGH-LEVEL EVENTS

- High-Level Briefing to Member States on UNOCT's Programmes and Projects in Central Asia focused on achievements and the way forward (23 Jan)
- Interactive Event on the International PVE Day organized by the Permanent Mission of Iraq to the UN (13 Feb)
- Connect and Learn Platform won the gold medal at the 2024 Learning Platform of the Year Awards (Feb)
- Security Council meeting on the 18th report of the Secretary-General on the threat posed by ISIL (Da'esh) (15 Feb)
- UN Security Council CTC regional open briefing on counter-terrorism-efforts in South-East Europe (28 Feb)

KEY ISSUES RAISED BY HEADS OF ENTITIES

- SG Guterres underscored that "our collective response to terrorism must be grounded in the principles that define our shared humanity—respect for human rights, the rule of law, and the pursuit of peace" (24 Jan)
- UNOCT USG Voronkov emphasized that "the transnational nature of terrorism requires stronger international cooperation and innovative partnerships, especially with regional organizations" (24 Jan)
- UNODC ED Waly highlighted that "coordination is key, whether between different agencies on the national level, between different Member States, or between UN entities and international organizations, and specifically among Compact entities" (24 Jan)
- OHCHR ASG Brands Kehris stressed that "the first line of defence against violence and conflict should be an examination of the root causes, promotion of the rule of law and respect for human rights" (24 Jan)
- CTED ASG Gherman noted that "the transnational and decentralized character of the threat posed by Da'esh and its affiliates continues to demand a nimble international strategy focusing on multilateralism, information-sharing, and cooperation across borders" (15 Feb)

- UN Special Rapporteur on counter-terrorism and human rights briefed EU Member States on international humanitarian law in the Israel-Gaza crisis (12 Jan)
- UNOCT CT TECH initiative provided tailored capacity-building support to Trinidad and Tobago (9-12 Jan) and Kenya (29 Jan)
- UNOCT workshop on Vulnerable Targets Protection and Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) in Togo (31 Jan)

The close and mutually reinforcing relationship between the Global Counterterrorism Forum (GCTF) and the Counter-Terrorism Compact continues to evolve.

Regular coordination meetings strengthen practical, structured cooperation and foster further coordination on priorities and programming. The GCTF invited Compact partners to co-lead initiatives to develop:

- GCTF Border Security and Management – [Addendum to the 2016 GCTF Good Practices in the Area of Border Security and Management](#)

In 2022, the Working Groups of the Counter-Terrorism Compact and the GCTF developed a Joint Options Paper to enhance collaboration, including on topics such as the use of new and emerging technologies for terrorist purposes and gender mainstreaming in all counter-terrorism related activities.
