ABOUT US



The United Nations Global Counter-Terrorism Coordination Compact was launched by Secretary-General António Guterres in February 2018 to strengthen the coordination of UN counter-terrorism efforts and promote an 'all-of-UN' approach in counter-terrorism.

[The Counter-Terrorism Compact](#) is the largest coordination framework across the three pillars of work of the United Nations: peace and security; sustainable development; and human rights. It currently consists of 46 UN and non-UN entities.

It is the primary institutional vehicle for the coordination and coherence of UN counter-terrorism efforts, and provides support to Member States in their implementation of the [United Nations Global Counter-Terrorism Strategy](#).

The Under-Secretary-General for Counter-Terrorism chairs the Counter-Terrorism Compact Coordination Committee, which comprises the representatives of all Counter-Terrorism Compact entities, as well as the Chairs and Vice-Chairs of its eight Working Groups.

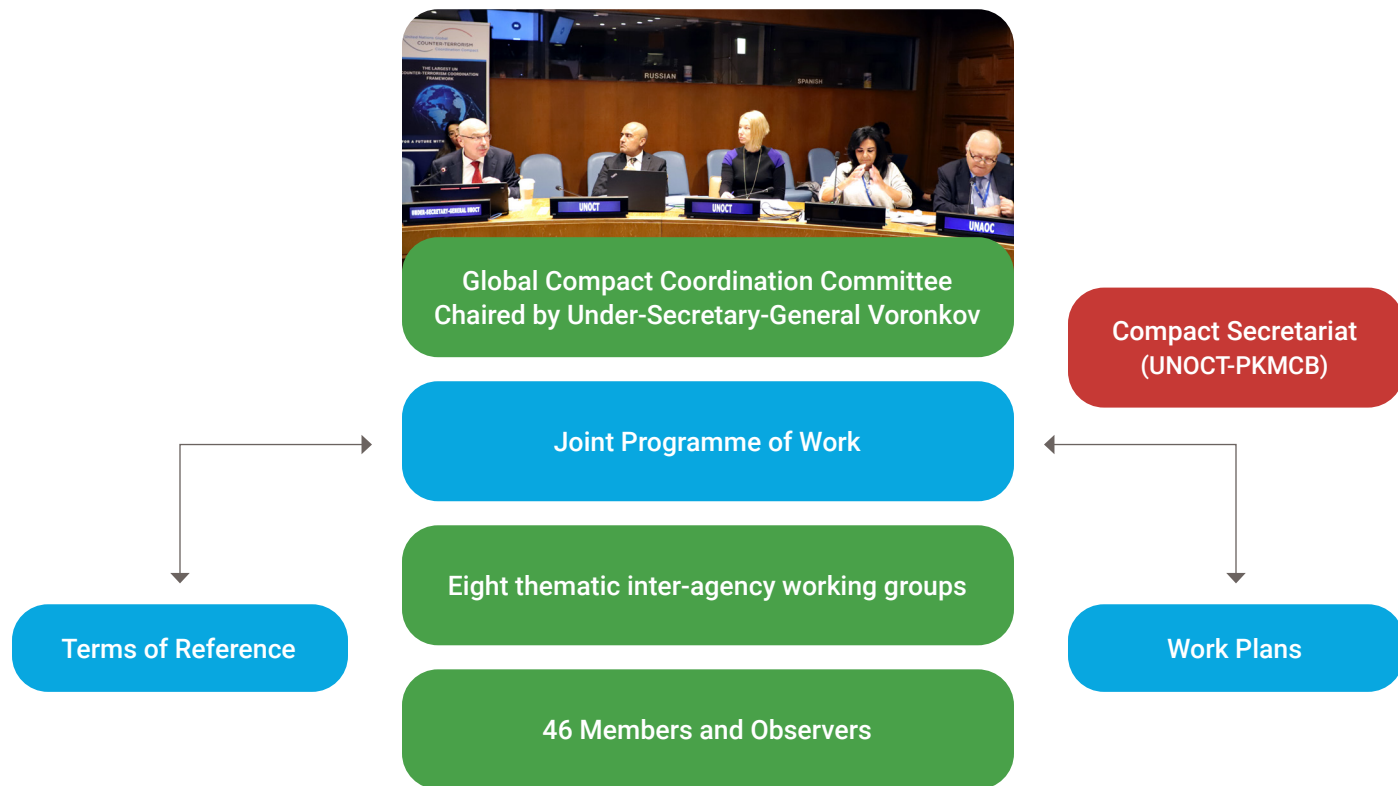

The [Eleventh Coordination Committee Meeting](#) was held on 5-6 February 2025, in New York, focusing on the “Pact for the Future and the United Nations Global Counter-Terrorism Coordination Compact: Strengthening Policy Interventions and Building Member State Capacities to Prevent and Counter Terrorism”. The Coordination Committee adopted a [Decisions Document](#) reaffirming the United Nations commitment to supporting Member States in implementing the Pact and strengthening global counter-terrorism efforts.

ANNUAL RETREAT



The United Nations Global Counter-Terrorism Coordination Compact hosted its first-ever Annual Retreat on 25 June 2025 in New York. This event was held under the theme [“Strengthening Partnerships between Regional Organizations and the UN Counter-Terrorism Coordination Compact through Policy Interventions and Capacity Building”](#), supporting Action 23(c) of the Pact for the Future.

The retreat gathered over 100 participants, including Permanent Representatives and representatives of regional organizations. An action plan with indicators will be issued soon to advance the UN’s collaboration with regional organizations on Counter-Terrorism.

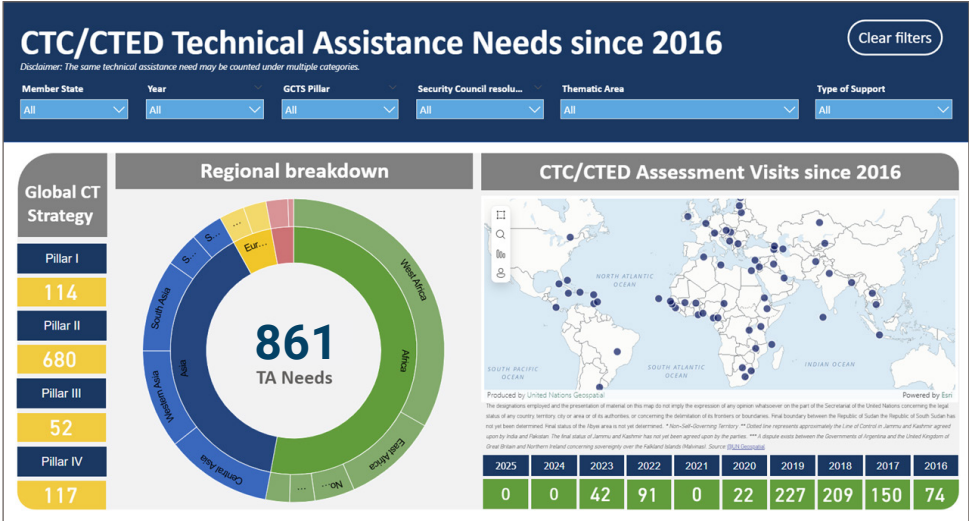

CTC/CTED ASSESSMENT DASHBOARD

The CTC/ CTED Assessment Dashboard is a tool hosted on the Global Counter-Terrorism Coordination Platform that allows Compact entities to search the technical assistance needs and assessment documents shared by CTED, in line with Security Council resolution 2617 (2021).

The Dashboard was developed by UNOCT and is curated by CTED to help inform the design of targeted capacity-building efforts, including in furthering the balanced implementation of the Global Counter-Terrorism Strategy across all four of its pillars.



ENHANCING MORE SPECIFIC COORDINATION

- 14 Regional Organizations have nominated their focal points to the Platform
- At the Seventh Coordination Committee meeting held on 14 December 2021, the Compact entities unanimously endorsed the Options Paper that propose **7 practical steps for enhancing regional and field coordination** through the Counter-Terrorism Compact

1	Take into account country-specific recommendations from entities that have developed a strong knowledge and expertise in country situations
2	Include agenda items focused on addressing thematic issues in specific countries or regions
3	Invite field staff of entities to their meetings, including Resident Coordinators and UNOCT of countries affected by terrorism
4	Engage with civil society organizations, women-led organizations and networks, youth, academic institutions, and the private sector representatives
5	Strengthen their engagements with Member States and regional organizations, and invite them to brief during their sessions and/or meetings
6	Explore concrete options for collaboration with the GCTF working groups
7	Leverage the Compact Platform to increase the online collaboration between Compact entities and Member States' focal points, and to grant access of field representatives from Compact entities to working group's spaces

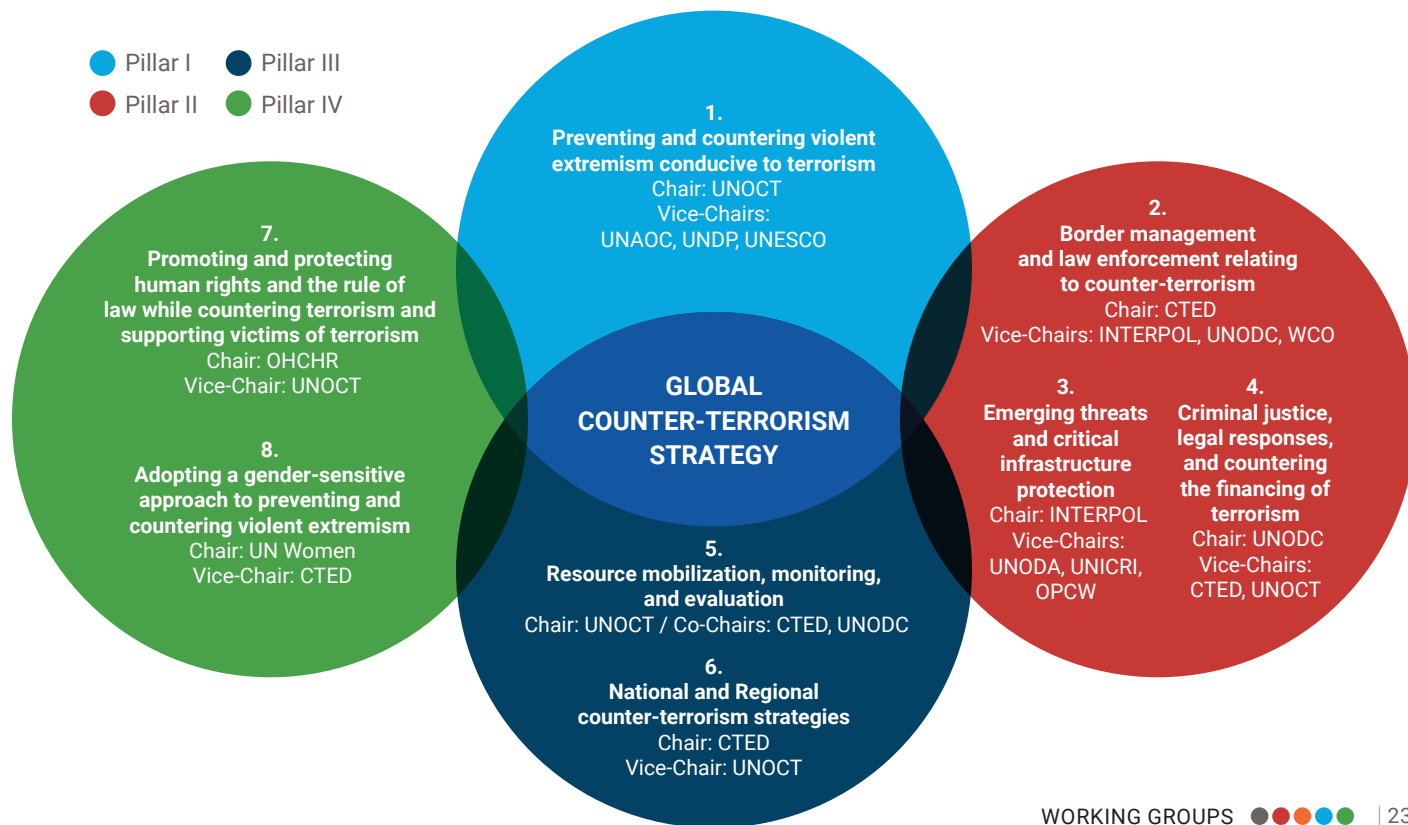

LEADERSHIP, COORDINATION, COHERENCE

KEY HIGH-LEVEL EVENTS

- UN OSAPG, the Department of Global Communications and the Permanent Mission of Bosnia and Herzegovina, co-organized the International Day of Reflection and Commemoration of the 1995 Genocide in Srebrenica which this year marked its 30th anniversary (8 July)
- The UN commemorated the Eighth International Day of Remembrance of and Tribute to the Victims of Terrorism under the theme “*United by Hope: Collective Action for Victims of Terrorism*”, during which victims and survivors of terrorism shared powerful testimonies of resilience, while the Group of Friends of Victims of Terrorism, co-chaired by Iraq and Spain, reaffirmed international solidarity and commitment (21 Aug)
- UN Security Council briefing highlighted that escalating terrorism in West Africa and the Sahel hits women the hardest (7 Aug)
- UNOCT USG Voronkov, CTED ASG/ED Gherman and FATF President de Anda Madrazo briefed the United Nations Security Council on the 21st Secretary-General’s report on the threat posed by ISIL (Da’esh) to international peace and security and the range of UN efforts in support of Member States in countering the threat (20 Aug)

KEY ISSUES RAISED BY HEADS OF ENTITIES

- Addressing the UN Security Council, UN Women USG/ED Bahous highlighted that terrorism has forced over 1 million girls in Niger, Mali, and Burkina Faso out of school, with a 218% surge in abductions in Burkina Faso (7 Aug)
- Briefing the UN Security Council, UNOCT USG Voronkov called for sustained global cooperation address the threat posed by ISIL (Da’esh) to international peace and security, echoing the Pact for the Future’s commitment to countering terrorism (20 Aug)
- In her briefing to the UN Security Council, CTED ASG/ED Gherman stressed that terrorism is growing more complex amid tech and geopolitical shifts, reaffirming CTED’s support for Member States (20 Aug)
- FATF President de Anda Madrazo presented the FATF’s Comprehensive Update on Terrorism Financing Risks to the UN Security Council, emphasizing that “by turning off the money tap, we can cut off the blood supply of terrorism” (20 Aug)
- Marking the International Day of Remembrance of and Tribute to the Victims of Terrorism, UN Secretary-General Guterres underscored that “around the world, victims and their associations are turning solidarity into action, supporting one another, raising their voices, and championing the rights of all victims” (21 Aug)

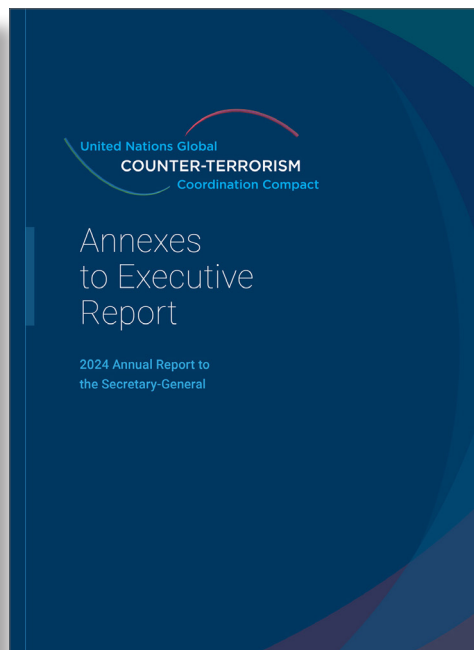

PARTNERSHIP WITH GLOBAL COUNTERTERRORISM FORUM



The close and mutually reinforcing relationship between the Global Counterterrorism Forum (GCTF) and the Counter-Terrorism Compact continues to evolve.

Regular coordination meetings strengthen practical, structured cooperation and foster further coordination on priorities and programming. The GCTF invited Compact partners to co-lead initiatives to develop:

In 2022, the Working Groups of the Counter-Terrorism Compact and the GCTF developed a [Joint Options Paper](#) to enhance collaboration, including on topics such as the use of new and emerging technologies for terrorist purposes and gender mainstreaming in all counter-terrorism related activities.
